

INDIANAPOLIS IN REVIEW

DEADEYES began showing up early - several familiar faces were noticeable around the lobby by Tuesday night.

The ninth annual reunion of the 96th Infantry Division Association was held at the Claypool Hotel on July 28, 29 and 30.

A total of 364 men plus families checked in at the registration tables. This was 32 more than the previous record established just last year in Minneapolis.

MEMORIAL SERVICES AT THE REUNION



Rev. Leonard F. Todd (left) of Moro, Illinois, conducted Memorial Services on Saturday morning, July 30th. He served with DEADEYES all the way, having been Regimental Chaplain for 382. He was introduced by Col. Cyril Sterner (right) C.O., 2nd Bn., 382.

His text was taken from John 15:13; Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.

Reverend Todd said that he believed that soldiers could best tell the real life meaning of the word "friend" because all men were the same in battle, a friend to others. Many comrades laid down their lives for their friends and others endured sufferings and hardships and thought of their buddies first in the line of duty.

Christ put true self to work by laying down his life. He brought life eternal to all who worship Him by suffering on the cross. This happened many years ago on Easter Sunday morning.

In recalling the Easter Sunday landing on Okinawa in 1945, Rev. Todd declared that there was a parallel between those dates separated by 1900 years.

"You men did not wait and ask questions when you were called. You and your buddies went and did your duty for your God, Country, family and last, yourself. When a man can perform this fourfold duty, he is indeed a friend to others."

Col. Cyril D. Sterner (Picture on page 3) 46 Ripley Drive Redstone Arsenal, Alabama 35809

Colonel Sterner was C.O. of 2nd Bn., 382 from start to finish. This man proved his leadership on Leyte, then fate put him and his men where the action was; right down the middle of Okinawa through Ginowan, over Nishibaru Ridge, Tanabaru Escarpment and the ordeal at Shuri.

Company E of his battalion was awarded Battle Honors by the War-Department.

Among many personal awards and decorations, the Colonel wears the Silver Star, Purple Heart and Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster.

Since 1963, this Nebraskan (or Corn Husker) has been assigned as Land Combat Commodity manager of the Missile Command for the Aircraft Weapons Program. His job is concerned with developing firepower systems for helicopters, bringing a new kind of operational capability to Viet Nam. MICOM does not actually manufacture hardware, it does conduct basic investigations as well as exploratory and advanced testing and reliability evaluations of equipment in the field.

The Colonel and Harriett, his wife, have four girls. He lists them as follows: Michael - junior at Auburn Univ. in Ala.; Jan - freshman at Univ. of Nebr.; Cindy - 11th grade; Teresa - 7th grade.
