Adair Base Up For Sale

CORVALLIS (AP) — The 360-acre Adair Air Force Station has been declared surplus property and the General Services Administration is considering a bid for the land by the United States International University.

Rod Kreger, assistant administrator for the GSA, informed Rep. Wendell Wyatt, R-Ore., that federal agencies had no use for the buildings and land and that it had been declared surplus.

The direction center building at the station will be retained for use by the Office of Emergency Preparedness, Kreger said.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has asked GSA to approve the bid by United States International University, a San Diego-based school which plans to establish an Oregon campus at Adair.

Army Grub

The first of our U.S. Army rations were established by Congressional Resolution on November 4, 1775:

Resolved, that a ration consists of the following kind and quantity of provisions:

l lb. beef or % lb. pork, or l lb. salt fish per day;

l lb. bread or flour, per day;

3 pints of peas or beans;

l pint of milk per man per day, or at the rate of 1/72 of a dollar;

l half pint of rice or one pint of Indian meal, per man per day;

l quart of spruce beer or cider per man per day, or 9 gallons of molasses per company of 100 men per week;

3 lbs. candles to 100 men per week, for guards; and

24 lbs. soft or 8 lbs. hard soap, for 100 men per week.

DENVER AND BEYOND

HOWARD RAGSDALE, Denver Reunion Chairman, has chosen a committee to assist him in planning the program and to handle the meeting details next summer. Members are Wayne L. Some of the preliminary results of their work appear on the last page of this newsletter with the printing of the hotel reservation card and an announcement regarding a special tour.

Remember, it is necessary to have reservations confirmed before your arrival in Denver. The Hilton Hotel is holding a block of 200 rooms for the Association, but only up until two weeks prior to the reunion. If there is a chance that you will be attending the reunion, go ahead and make a reservation; it can always be broken at a later date.

The special tour to Colorado Springs, the Air Force Academy and the chuckwagon supper, a new and entirely different kind of event for the Association, necessarily requires the making of numerous arrangements. Ragsdale and his committee want your trip to Denver to be especially enjoyable, so let them know if you will be there.

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Have you heard that the Association might sponsor a 3-week excursion to Hawaii, the Philippines, Okinawa and Japan? This is another idea that has come from HOWARD RAGS-DALE, who is proposing that the trip would take place during January and February 1972 with the cost being estimated at a maximum of \$1500.00 if there were to be only 15 reservations. Indications are that the price would go down considerably with larger participation.

Do you recall that day in late July 1944 when the 96th Infantry Division came to Hawaii? The transports arrived in Honolulu Harbor with its famous Aloha Tower landmark, then, after the inevitable confusion and endless waiting we boarded the Pineapple Express for the ride to Tent City at Schofield Barracks.

From the harbor the train took us past the Libby cannery, out along the shore toward the huge complex that is Pearl Harbor. Our excitement mounted as we neared Pearl, for we expected to see at first hand the ravages of the war and, I suppose, some indication of the Enemy. Instead, we caught only glimpses of that immensely important navy yard with its associated facilities and did not see so much as a chipped piece of concrete, for rebuilding of Pearl had started almost as soon as the bombing had stopped and the fires had been put out.


We went by train through Kipapa Gulch, emerging up into the central plateau that was liberally carpeted in the lush and varied greens of growing fields of pineapple and sugar cane. Here, the Pineapple Express reached the end of its line, so we were herded into 2½-ton trucks that took us the rest of the way to Tent City, located across the highway from the main Schofield Barracks area.


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



- #3 NATIONAL MEMORIAL CEMETERY OF THE PACIFIC is lolocated on the floor of an extinct volcano called Punchbowl.
 #4 Marble tablets with names of men missing in action from WW II (including DEADEYES), Korea and Vietnam flank the central stairway to this monument at the cemetery.

From Schofield Barracks most of us went to the windward side of Oahu and the vicinity of Kahana Bay, the locale that had been selected for our training in village fighting. It was there that many of us, for the first time, began to realize the charm that Hawaii offered away from the concrete and clamor of Waikiki and the tourist environs. Our vibouac home adjoining the training area had an open air theater that seemed to draw rain just at show time. Across the highway was the ocean.


Down the road are signs of the old P-38 field, one side bordered by the ocean and the other by thick kiawe bushes that served as revetments. Marked at one end by the old sugar mill built of coral, the runway was bisected at the other end by the around-the-island highway. At that point, an MP was stationed to stop highway traffic during takeoffs and landings.


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#5 - The old, narrow, vine-draped, two-lane TRANS ISLAND HIGHWAY


- that DEADEYES knew has been replaced by a four-lane monstrosity,







ABANDONED SUGAR MILL

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Now the landing field is barely discernible through the placid surroundings of the dairy that thrives on that spot. The old control tower stood over the farmhouse until 1948. Today only the farmhouse remains as a reminder of the activity that took place there.

The public park we used for a mess area remains as does a little country store, but the tent area has become a suburban housing development. True, some things are better. The beach is there without any barbed wire; the ocean is there and there are no restrictions against swimming at any time; and the highway has been improved.

Back to the other side of the island across the mountains, many of the major military establishments of our time are still in operation. There is Schofield Barracks, of course, but the land on which our Tent City stood has been returned to its original use - the growing of pineapple. Schofield Barracks is still an active installation of the U.S. Army where troops were staged for the Korean action and continuing now with a similar purpose for Vietnam.




VILLAGE FIGHTING BIVOUAC AREA IS PRESENT-DAY HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

Two relatively new installations are active now. Tripler General Hospital, which was being built during our stay here (we went past the site on the Pineapple Express) serves as the main medical facility for the Pacific and in Hawaii as the principal armed forces hospital for all military personnel and their dependents. Barbers Point Naval Air Station, located across the Waianae Range from Schofield Barracks was activated in the late 1940's.


Our stay in Hawaii as the 96th Infantry Division has not been entirely forgotten. For example, behind a metal grillwork that frames the main entrance to Headquarters, United States Army, Pacific, is a display of insignia of many of the units that participated in the campaigns in the Pacific in WW II. Our double diamond takes its place proudly with the others. There is an inscription that I see nearly every day and which reads as follows:

"In allegiance to these insignia, faithful to their country and inspired by its cause, professional and civilian soldiers in their sacrifices for victory earned the gratitude of mankind. Crusaders for the right in the Pacific Ocean Areas of a global war they fought, bled and died that a free people might live for all time in security, dignity and peace."

PROFILE

Wayne Gocke, writer of the Aloha Essay, entered the Army in 1943 from Kansas, the state where he was born and educated. His entire service career was spent with 383-F. After receiving a medical discharge as result of wounds received on Okinawa, he completed his education at George Williams College in Chicago.

Wayne married Phyllis in 1948. That same year he began working for the Y. M. C. A. in Honolulu, later getting involved in a Civil Service training program with the U.S. Army. At present, he is the Assistant Program and Budget Officer in the office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, Headquarters, United States Army, Pacific, a job that requires him to make occasional trips to such places as Japan, Korea and Okinawa.

The Gockes live in Honolulu in an old home, recently remodeled, overlooking the University of Hawaii and Waikiki. Diamond Head is their back drop.

Summing up his thoughts regarding the island that has been his home for about 22 years, he emphasizes that it is still a pleasant and lovely place, as it was, even in wartime, although there are signs that the old "Aloha" spirit is being spoiled. He adds that is was not his intention to disillusion anyone about the way things are now in the last peaceful jumping off place for DEADEYES and where the month of August 1944 was over to quickly as men of the 96th hurried toward the greatest adventures of their lives.

EASLEY MONUMENT ON OKINAWA TO BE RENOVATED

Since Jim Breece, Historian, will be making a trip to Okinawa during this winter, he has been authorized to represent the 96th Infantry Division Association in handling of repairs that are to be made to the Easley monument. The missing brass plate will be replaced with an inset granite or marble plate with the same inscription as the original. A second plate may be added with a translation in Japanese. The site and trail will be improved and a location marker will be placed on the road giving directions to the memorial site.
