

Nobody ever persuaded Lyle Ridgway to venture that far above the ground, so the actual identity of the Signalman up a tree in the Philippines remains a mystery.

"I never climbed a pole. They couldn't get me to go up one of those practice poles that was set up in the company area at Camp Adair," Ridgway says, recalling basic training over 46 years afterwards.

"One day they took a bunch of us 'greenies' out to the poles. A noncom gave me the spikes and a belt and told me to try to climb. I was afraid I didn't weigh enough to dig the spikes in deep enough to keep from sliding down the pole. A man could get a terrible burn that way. That happened sometimes.

"This same day I watched Hubert Hoffman run up one of those poles like a squirrel. He sat on the top of it. Yeah! That showed me that I didn't belong up there."

Instead of stringing wire, Ridgway says he plugged a switchboard at the Division CP during the Leyte and Okinawa campaigns.

Another error - in the cutline, the alleged Ridgeway's name is misspelled and coupled with the middle initial C. instead of correctly with a G.

## WHEN THINGS ARE NOT WHAT THEY SEEM TO BE

Onward to the reunion in Rapid City, South Dakota, in the summer of 1989.

The outsize Howard Johnson Motel sign anchored into the granite of its own hillock proclaims "Welcome 96th Infantry Division Association" beckening pilgrims on I-90 from horizon to horizon to exit now. Really, this is a sight for sore eyes - the kind a driver gets from squinting across a sunburned landscape for a couple of days or so.

For most a pit stop comes first, next, a walk-through of the new encampment replete with shouts, glad hands and backslaps and hugs and kisses. The place throbs with so much happy talk that a new arriver is tempted to retreat to the parking lot for a break.

The scenery at these reunions includes a fair number of cripples and amputees. They are the ones who were partly chewed up and spat out by two long-ago meat grinding campaigns. Anybody who goes with crutches or prosthesis or whatever it takes to stay mobile had to be a beat up warrior. Right?

It is such assumption that bothers Lyle Ridgway, 1502 Windrider Court, Fenton, Missouri THE STORY OF THE 96th INFANTRY DIVISION

63026. People jump to conclusions. Since not many besides relatives and a few Army buddies know how the condition came about, imaginations run away. This is why Ridgway confesses to feeling sort of like a fraud or imposter. He was not an infantryman up on the line or even in close support.

By now Lyle is used to being the object of some curiosity. Onlookers are a fact of his life - no big deal.

And the show goes on late this Thursday morning when the Ridgway van crawls in under the shade of the marquee. An offloading drill starts after a husky young fellow pops the double side doors. With a whir a lift descends from inside the van. The roll out of a wheeled chair (gurney) with Ridgway aboard takes place in slow motion. At touchdown, he trundles off heading for the registration desk.

A while later and apart from the commotion, Ridgway tells the rest of the story - how he went to war and came back home without a scratch only to be felled by disease.

At the Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, Separation Center the doctors gave out that old routine: "If you have any medical problems, tell us."
Ridgway says he kept his mouth shut because they
would have made him stay for more physicals.

"What I wanted was that discharge. I got it and went to Sioux City, Iowa, where my parents lived.

"But I knew something was wrong because of the pain in my back. I thought, 'Well, that is from sleeping on the ground.' I didn't know how I looked, but I was already getting stooped.

"When I enrolled in Morningside College, my night job was in a packing plant - carrying pork from one table to another all night long. My back pain got quite bad, so I had to quit the job."


The VA refused to pay for a brace that a doctor had had made. Instead, Ridgway was invited to report to the VA hospital in Des Moines, Iowa, for examination. After that, compensation checks started coming regularly.

Ridgway says that he will always remember that day in April 1952 when a family doctor told him what he had: "Your ailment is called rheumatoid spondylitis.\*

"... It's irreversible. You'll be getting worse. Eventually you are going to be in a bad way. All I can do is give you pills to limit the pain."

Meantime, Ridgway graduated from the University of Iowa with a degree in History and a minor in Business Administration. The VA in St. Louis, Missouri, then employed him for 13 years as a real estate mortgage loan officer.

Imagine what it is like to go through life unable to bend forward or sit in a chair because the spine is poker straight. This condition makes any journey hard to deal with for Lyle Ridgway. Either Freddie or Donna stand by to manipulate the lift that is built into the van. Once on the ground, Lyle works the hand controls to move and steer this new battery-powered chair. He has the choice of reclining or standing positions.

\*Rheumatoid spondylitis is a chronic and progressive arthritis that typically attacks all joints of the spine. The disease occurs almost exclusively (90%) in young men. Recent genetic research shows that people with a particular gene are more likely to be stricken. An increased susceptibility to the disease is inherited and not the disease itself.

His civil service career was cut short by an automobile accident in 1976. "My condition had been getting worse, but it didn't help to have my neck broken in the accident. Fortunately, my spinal cord wasn't severed, but I was paralyzed and bedridden for over a year and a half. During an operation to relieve the pressure on my spinal cord, the doctors also removed whatever had caused my neck to be frozen rigid in an upright position. My neck fell to the right and froze again."

The Paralyzed Veterans of America went to bat with an application for a specially adapted house.

"Last night we were in a restaurant. While I was standing there at the table as I have to do waiting for dinner, a guy at the next table turned around and greeted me, 'How are you doing DEADEYE?' We passed a few pleasantries. He told me his name - Leonard Lazarick from Corydon, Pennsylvania, from K-382. Finally, when we had to get back to eating, he said to me just before he turned around, 'I'm honored you talked to me.'

"I thought, 'He's honored I talked to him.'

"It should be just the reverse. I am not
sure I belong in the company of men like him,
trading on the Division patch we all wore. The
fact that I did not wear the Combat Infantryman's Badge says it all. We were exposed to
some danger on a few occasions, but danger was
a rifleman's daily companion. It is not possible to equate that with physical discomfort
and some spasms of fear.

"He thinks I was badly wounded. I don't believe he said what he did because it was a bit difficult for me to get here.

"I'll never forget that. He said, 'I'm honored you talked to me."

There is a postscript to this story. Lyle and his entourage showed up in usual good spirits at the reunion in Omaha. Just two weeks afterwards, death took him suddenly.


Paul Konietzko United States Air Force SAC, Omaha, Ne.


The Spokane reunion committee has been planning an interesting and fun reunion for all Deadeyes and their families. A couple of things should be brought to your attention.


