

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

WHO IS OUR LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY, 35th REUNION SITE CHAIRMAN?????????

In 1944 when the 96th Infantry Division received an attached tank Battalion, he was a very green 2nd Lt. Platoon leader proudly commanding the 3rd Platoon of Company "D" 763rd Tank Battalion. Schoefield Barracks didn't offer us much of an opportunity to get acquainted, but on Leyte this 2nd Lt. learned that tankers NEVER, NEVER ought to tangle with the enemy without friendly Infantry nearby. Later in the foothills above Dagami, one Infantry patrol sadly learned they'd ought to wait for us in the mopping up operations so we could take the point. WE BECAME A TEAM.

Similar lessons were learned after our Easter landing on Okinawa. Our tanks attracted remarkable accurate artillery and anti-tank fire. This was a different type of war to the one we had on Leyte. Casualties increased and we learned to expect snipers behind the front lines, waiting for targets of opportunity. Again, the Infantry man on the ground told us where to lay our fire, and we dispatched considerable numbers to a meeting with their ancestors.

Ten years ago my wife and I attended our first reunion at Dearborn, Mi. We have missed only one since then. The happiness we've witnessed as friends of long ago are re-united, and the pleasure we experienced has been priceless. As beneficiaries of the fruit of others labors, we acknowledge an obligation, and hope to fulfill that obligation with a joyful 35th Reunion of the 96th Infantry Division Association on the 50th Anniversary of the Division's organization.

The 2nd Lieutenant took a brief try at civilian life after the war and elected to remain in the Army where his lovely wife to be, was waiting at Fort Knox. By 1962 the Army had progressed to the point that they thought they could make it without Rafferty, so he retired as a Major. Another Career with the Commonwealth of Kentucky convinced this individual that Kentucky is a good place to be. I hope everyone thoroughly enjoys their visit to the Blue Grass State. Thank You for permitting me to serve as your party chairman.

VonHolle signed on October 8, 1944, for 1240 men of the 3d Battalion of the 383d Infantry going ashore from the U.S.S. Bolivar. The 105 cases of beer cost \$189.00 In cash. Story and graphics by The bottom part of the mimeographed page was a Ed Dakan (B-381) receipt.

In early October 1944, way over on the far side of the Pacific Ocean at the Manus anchorage, a strike force began staging for MacArthur's return to the Philippines. The latrine rumors that the Leyte Campaign would be opening a lot sooner than expected were about to come true.

First to show were Navy fighting ships of all sorts - everything from baby flattops to destroyers and cruisers to battlewagons with their auxiliaries - settling in to take on fuel and ammunition.

Manus was one of the finest protected anchorages anywhere in the Pacific. There were 40-odd islands making up the Admiralty group, usually called Manus after the main island. Those islands, on the fringe of civilization at the time, were possessed by native descendants of headhunters who wanted nothing more than to go about their own business if outsiders would please leave them alone.

No way. As soon as the Japanese had been kicked out by the Americans, the Navy moved into Seeadler Harbor, which was big enough to handle a huge fleet.

But Manus, 47 days by slow boat to the southwest of Hawaii, happened to be practically astraddle of the Equator. Out there one miserably hot day tended to be followed by another just like it.

Last to arrive on that stinking scene during the final week of the buildup was the 96th Division in a lumbering herd of assault transports (APAs). Together these ships by the dozens crammed with thousands of travel-worn troops lay baking in the tropical heat. It looked for sure like the old waiting game had taken a turn for the worse.

Life for troops aboard a transport was crowded, uncomfortable and boring without letup. A typical APA was 492 feet long, with a 69-foot beam. Its rated speed was 16½ knots, carrying battle cargo in the lower holds and up to 1,500 troops, bunkered four to six deep, in the upper holds. Their decks were cluttered with landing craft.

Nobody worried much about security at Manus. The war had moved back north months ago; it was time to relax if possible. Now and then sailboats carrying brightly adorned natives trading souvenirs wandered amongst the big ships. At nightfall, on-deck movies were SOP. Then mixed audiences of soldiers and sailors lolled on hatches or any available perch.

The Navy had a thing about alcohol aboard ship. No question about ±1, every trip was bound to be bone-dry or else. Yet after such a long ride, the powers that be knew that loads of thirsty soldiers wanted something to drink besides desalted seawater.

The break came in a slow motion morning with the word for boat crews to standby. Landing craft (LCVPs) would be put in the water at 1300 hours. Anybody wanting to go ashore for beer should take his helmet and lifebelt. No canteens.

There were more than enough islands to go around, so a different one was assigned by battalions for the whole Division. The luck of the draw decided who got to go where. Some of the islands were just numbered flyspecks with the barest amount of clearing and straddle trenches dug then set aside strictly for partying. The larger islands had names such as Pityilu, "The Paradise of the Pacific."

Pityilu Island turned out to be the pride and joy of the Sea Bees. Their bulldozing and grooming had developed something along the lines of a city park back home. In addition to water fountains and picnic tables, there were privies.

At H-hour the harbor came alive with LCVPs buzzing around like bees swarming for nectar in a clover patch.

With a requisition for beer at the ready, Lt. Bob VonHolle led the 3d Battalion of the 383d Infantry onto the beach at Pityilu. After all, someone had to see to it that each man got his fair share.

VonHolle recalled recently how the beer bust at Manus went down and his part in it:

"I didn't know anything about that kind of job. Colonel May or somebody up the chain had made the arrangements. I said, 'Hey, I'm only a 1st lieutenant. I need help.'

"They said, 'No, but you can have the choice of any four sergeants you want.' So I took the 1st sergeants out of our battalion from I, K, L and M Companies.

"Those NCOs had more authority than anybody. Of course they pissed and mouned like everything because they were not allowed to have a beer. None of the five of us got any beer - I didn't get any, either.

"At the end of the party, they were carrying guys who had passed out and throwing them on the LCVPs. We got back to the Bolivar just before dark. Nobody went up cargo nets that night."

Payback Time

Someone having to do with reunion plans for old LST 226 came across an article describing VonHolle's induction into the OCS Hall of Fame. That story, which included a rehash of more lurid exploits of Company I on Okinawa, generated a phone call with an invitation to make a speech.

"They knew the 96th, but not particular units, of course, because they helped haul us up there for the invasion. He said, 'Maybe we can abort our political speaker if you will come talk to us.' (It turned out both speakers had their say.)

"I went to Cincinnati this spring for the LST reunion and had all the fun bullcrapping about the retraining at the hands of the Navy we old Army guys went through when we were kids. It was a matter of learning what the Navy was talking about to make the Division amphibious. Like when the admiral said, 'You will no longer walk on the floor; you'll walk on the deck. That is no longer a wall; it is a bulkhead. You will not have a rope; it is a line. Don't dismiss your men; secure them.' And so on. Those guys were roaring."

Then while he had the chance, VonHolle jumped on the swabbies about a certain order that came out of the ship's squawk box usually several times a day all the way across the Pacific Ocean.

"I told them I got tired of hearing 'so and so please lay up to the 1st lieutenant.' Who in the hell was the 1st lieutenant? Remember that? That was all they kept squawking.

Sure, I knew the 1st lieutenant was like the officer of the day and that was who they wanted the man to report to. But who was that 1st lieutenant they were always laying up to? They never said 'report' always 'lay up to.'"

THIS IS BOB VONHOLLE

The Bob VonHolle who supplied materials for the two stories in this newsletter is the same old soldier who was inducted into the Officer Candidate's School (OCS) Hall of Fame in May 1991. VonHolle may be best remembered among DEADEYES as having been the company commander of I-383. He was wounded and evacuated from Okinawa. His service accounted for eight decorations.

VonHolle's military career spanned 32 years. He spent six years in active Army service. He spent another 23 years in active Reserves as an amphibious expert on loan to other branches of the military.

Meantime, Bob and his wife, Emily, raised a mostly military family. One son is an Army major and the other son is an Air Force major. A daughter spent four years as an Army nurse. The other daughter skipped military service and is a reading and speech therapist.

After the VonHolles took ownership of the Zimmer Hardware in Covington, KY, in 1965, Bob continued teaching some business classes at Northern Kentucky University.

"I was inducted into the OCS Hall of Fame because of my service after my active career, VonHolle said. "I started out as a private and advanced to a full colonel. That is one requirement for induction into the Hall of Fame. Lots of good men went through the school, but left the service before making colonel." Of the 178,000 officers commissioned through OCS, VonHolle said only 1,500 have been inducted into the Hall of Fame.





Dear Mrs. Strand:

I was flattered and amazed that the Deadeye Disnatch had reprinted the St. Louis Post-Dispatch story about my retirement in April 1990. After 46 years I had made the Deadeye again!

I was the cartoonist, not a writer, in the early days of the Deadeye on Leyte. The captain in the 96th Recons who censored my mail enjoyed my humor and apparently decided that I would do less harm to the war effort if I were put on temporary duty with the division's new daily newspaper.

Interviewing Irving Berlin was one of the highlights of my time with the paper, but a case of infectious hepatitis kept me from seeing his show. Malaria showed up on the day I arrived at Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, to be discharged, but otherwise I came through unscathed.

The Deadeye reaches me late because it still comes to the Post-Dispatch, so I first learned about your reprinting the article when I received a phone call from a lady whose husband was killed while serving with the 96th on Okinawa. She just wanted to talk to someone who'd been there, although I explained to her that I was in a relatively safe area with the newspaper.

The only other celebrity that I met while with the 96th was Margorie Main, the tough old actress that the division chose to be its "Occupation Cal." She hugged me when I stepped off the gangplank at San Pedro, Calif., because she believed that as an editor of the eadeye I must have been responsible for her election. I didn't confess that I had hoped one of the more glamorous movie stars of that time would be elected. Yvonne Bedarlo, I recall, was one of the runners-up. Oh, well.

I have dreamed of someday holding a reunion of the staff members of the Deadeye Dispatch from the days of Leyte and Okinawa. If any of the gang has similar feelings, I hope they'll contact me.
