




A Unlikely Happening at the Nugget

Perhaps not once in a blue moon, maybe never before, have two relatives, both of them DEADEYES, though separated by generations, sat together at the banquet.

Grandfather Scott Kay, now in his 80s and who hails from Sparks, Nevada, was among the first timers at the reunion. Once he served as a loader for the 155mm howitzers of the 363d Field Artillery Battalion in the Philippines. His grandson, Capt. Steve Russell of Mountain Home, Idaho, is company commander of Headquarters Company, 321st Engineer Battalion, part of the 96th ARCOM.


Captain Russell is a park ranger for the State of Idaho in real life. Nineteen years ago he began his military career as an infantryman attached to the Third Armored Division in Germany. After that he got into the Army Reserve program and went through ROTC at Boise State University. Since the 96th Army Reserve Command is made up of units scattered through the largest geographical area of the United States, including Captain Russell's home state, all of the reservists out there wear the double diamond patch.

According to Captain Russell, the rapid downsizing and realignment that is currently going on among the U.S. military forces may eliminate the 96th ARCOM. "It is just a rumor right now. They are going to cut out some



ARCOMs, but haven't specified which ones. I will be meeting with other members of the ARCOM in August at the time of our Mobilization Readiness Review. That is usually the time when they notify us of changes....

"We hope we can hang in there and survive. If not, we will go to a different support group."

Did you think the reunion might turn into something that would last?


Percy: Not really."

DEADEYES

HELP RESTORE THE OKINAWA MONUMENTS TO BRIG. GEN. EASLEY AND COL. MAY.

THE BACKGROUND - In 1971-1972 over 400 Deadeyes contributed to a fund for the placing of permanent monuments on Okinawa dedicated to our Assistand Division Commander, Brig. General Claudius Easley and the 383rd Infantry Regiment Commander, Col. Edwin May. Both of these officers were killed during the Battle of Okinawa and were chosen as representatives to memorialize all Deadeyes who fell during the battle.

Until 1987, these beautiful stone monuments proudly accupied a site on Yuza Dake escarpment near the southern tip of Okinawa. However, in 1987 the U. S. Army, without contacting the 96th Infantry Division Association, moved the two monuments from our site where General Easley was killed to a small Army Post, Torii Station which is far removed from our World War II Battlefields. With the site now vacant and apparently abandoned, it became part of a golf course fairway.

PROPOSED MONUMENT RESTORATION TO BATTLEFIELD SITE -- Two 96th Infantry Division Association members, Alva "Smitty" Smith and Don Dencker, both of Company L, 382 Infantry, and aided by our Okinawan friend, Alex Kishoba, tracked down the missing monuments and have obtained approval for the relocation of the monuments to a battlefield site called the General Buckner site. This is the location where our X Army Commander General Buckner was killed and is not far from our former Yuza Dake site.

This permanent relocation and restoration has been approved by the Prefecture Government of Okinawa and by the Okinawa War Dead Association. The War Dead Association is the owner and provider of perpetual care of the Buckner Site. (All sites under the care of the War Dead Association are considered hallowed ground.)

THE PLAN -- We have been promised volunteer help and equipment assistance to restore the Easley and May monuments to this permanent battlefield location by the U. S. Army and the U. S. Marine Corps. However there is a need for approximately \$2500 in donations to complete this worthy task. This includes landscapting and a bronze plaque to clarify the "Killed on this spot" notation on both monument stones.

OKINAWA BATTLE MONUMENT UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The Prefecture Government of Okinawa is undertaking the construction of an Okinawa Battle Monument to be called the "Cornerstone of Peace." The monument will have artistic beauty and is designed with a theme similar to that of our Viet Nam Memorial. It is to be a register of all who perished in the battle -- 200,000 persons.

The Okinawans wish to include the names of all Americans who fought and died. Accordingly, the names of all Deadeyes listed as killed in the 96th Infantry Division History have been given to the Okinawa authority constructing the monument.

THE OUESTION IS:

Are all of our honored Okinawa Battle Dead listed? Are some who dies of wounds missing?

WE WANT NO DEADEYE FORGOTTEN.

If you know of any unlised 96th Infantry Division man or attached outfit person who perished on Okinawa, please advise our Corresponding Secretary as soon as possible. Send Information to:

The U. S. Marine. Corps, the U. S. Navy and other U. S. Army outfits are cooperating in this effort. The Okinawa Battle Monument is scheduled for dedication on June 22, 1995, 50 years after the declared end of the battle.

TOAST TO THE DEADEYES

I want to offer this toast to you, my comrades in arms. I was priviliged to serve with you in a great epic adventure.

We met a proud adversary who had never lost in battle, who never was routed, well equipped, dedicated, and you might even say fanatical.

We met him in the very center of the Philippines where we were isolated and encircled and on a battle field where he could be and was reinforced. We beat him but we weren't finished and neither was he.

We met him again on Easter Sunday 1945 on the last step to his homeland. He was dug in, brilliantly led and determined to resist and to defeat us.

We made progress in feet and occasionally we were forced to retreat in yards. The enemies' retreat was begrudging, costly to us - organized, yet strategically made so that each new attack was more fiercely resisted with a tragic toll to us.

We daily walked in the Valley of the Shadow of Death. We saw many of our friends and comrades fall and in the words of that great hymn, "Christ died to make men holy' - we died to make men free.

Everyone, even those who didn't serve, participated in America's victory, but only the infantryman, the queen of battle who met and defeated the enemy on his own ground understood victory and it's cost.

We all know people of exemplary character and whose lives reflect a great sense of moral value, but only you and I have lived those values daily, only you and I stood in harms way in that Valley of the Shadow of Death and personally fulfilled those values, lived and died for those values. We remember and never shall forget.

I salute each and every one of you. I think of you and our fallen comrades often and each Sunday. May we continue to serve and may our daily lives continue to daily reflect those values that we fought by and died for.

Here's to the women of the 96th. Special women for special men. Our wives, mothers of our children, lovers, friends and fortunately constant companions.

They waited for us and we for them. Some waited anxiously while some of us were in battle. Others waited for us just as we waited for them without being aware of it, but when we met we knew that you were special for us - our life companions.

You were patient with us - making do as we started our life careers. You were always there, understanding, loving, encouraging, but always content. You understood our silence. You sensed that we were different - that the past implanted values on the present and guided our future.

You knew we loved you, that you were our comrade in love. You gave us children and raised them well. You taught them that they were loved, that they belonged and were part of our mission. You taught them values, to think, to love, and to understand and to know that they are a blessing and that they must reflect this in their lives.

As we grow older we need and appreciate you even more. Our love sustains us and grows. We share pride and concern in our offspring - always there to help them and welcoming the opportunity to enjoy and know our grandchildren.

We thank you and count you as our greatest blessing and know that the best is yet to come.


I see you at the meetings




