The Story of G. . Joseph Camilleri

BEGINNING IN 1984 WITH THE REUNION IN SAINT Paul, Minnesota, Joseph Camilleri (96th Sigual) has showed up every year since then.

JOE CAMILLERI ARRIVED IN SAINT LOUIS, MISSOURI, in early 1940. He needed a bike to get around town.



In October 1942 the trainride from the Army Reception Center at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri, to Oregon used up three nights and two days. The following morning those several hundred bedraggled draftees were lined up naked one more time for a physical inspection by the medics.

Right away after that, by an unknowable sorting process, Joseph "Joe" Camilleri and a few other men were parcelled out to the 96th Signal Company. An acting NCO led them away to their own area of Camp Adair.

From day one, Joe worried that his new friends were teasing: "Where are you really from?" The question was repeated so often that it had to be some kind of joke. He pretended to be aggravated. "You mean to tell me you don't know about Malta? What do you dumbbells know about geography?" In fact, nobody knew that there was such a place.

Soldiering together through thick and thin for the next three years fixed that and it worked both ways. Joe learned about "exotic" Texas or "wonderful" Minnesota et al while his comrades found out that Malta mattered a whole lot more than its relative size.

Malta's three inhabited islands and the two uninhabited ones - only 122 square miles in total - are nothing more than flyspecks on a

map of the world. This lovely island country lies basking in the Mediterranean Sea just south of Italy's toe and out beyond Sicily. Through the ages, perhaps earlier than Bible times, these rocky little pieces of real estate with a fine natural harbor have been coveted by selfish neighbors on all sides.

The British were the last foreigners in control; it was their military spending that kept things going through the end of Warld War I and for a while after that.

When Great Britain put up forts to guard their headquarters, one of the cannon was emplaced right next to the Camilleri farm, so of course the artillerymen had to be billeted nearby. Room was tight for everybody. Here was this Maltese family with its menagerie of livestock and poultry jammed together with soldiers and tools of their trade.

Joseph Camilleri was born in Mosta, Malta, in 1917 while the war was still going hot and heavy. In those days, it was customary for the new mother to stay in bed for a week or longer and have only some chicken broth with rice cooked in it to eat. As soon as she was up and around, there were farm chores to be done.

Baby Joe's day-care was turned over to the Tommies at their big gun. "Maybe that is why I liked the English and men in uniform," said Joe musing about those years.

"My mom took me to school when I was nine years old. The schoolmaster told her, 'We'll put him in kindergarten.' But she said, 'No! There are girls there,' so I skipped two years of kindergarten and stayed through the sixth grade. And I walked two miles each way carrying my sandals to save the leather.

"When I was 15 years old and out of school, I helped my brothers look after our few sheep and goats and feed the pigs. Later on, my paying job was working for a contractor for about one pound and one shilling (equal to \$5.25) a week wages. We buried telephone wire and built concrete machine gun nests."

Besides being crowded to the gunnels, Malta was desperately short of resources in the Great Depression of the '30s. Out-migration was not new to these unfortunate folk; it seemed like somebody was always leaving, many scattering to the United States, others to Australia and Canada.

Times were bad and tense, too. England and France were fighting again with Germany in 1939, a prelude to World War II. Joe was 22 years old. He wanted to follow his brother, Pacifico, who had gone ahead to the United States and settled in Saint Louis, Missouri. The Camilleri family accepted the idea that Joe's chances to make it in Malta did not amount to much.

But the visa did not come easily. The American Consul in Valletta waved a list as long as his arm. "These are the people who want out," he said. His interview with this physically fit male did speed the case along.

Shortly after Christmas in 1940, Joseph Camilleri set out to relocate. He travelled by boat to Syracuse, Sicily, by train to Naples. Italy, where he boarded the Italian liner "Rex" to spend nine days at sea bound for New York, U.S.A. Finally, another full day on a train put him in Saint Louis where he moved in with his brother on Devonshire Avenue.

Joe had nothing but holes in his pockets.
"I found a job at the Spencer Box Company. The next thing I had to do was to register for the draft. They classified me 1-A, but very soon a big brown envelope came in the mail. 'You do not have to serve in the Armed Forces of the United States of America if you do not wish to, however we always have the right to send you back to where you came from.' I wrote down, 'No objection.'

"My brother jumped about two feet, 'That's nothing if you aren't arrested or something. You're crazy! Why do you want to get your a--shot off?'

"I said, 'So what. They accepted me here. This is where I am going to make my home. I might as well do something for it.'"

Pfc. Joseph Camilleri did not perform any heroic deeds during his hitch with the 96th Signal Company; his job kept him behind the front lines. What he and his buddies in the wire platoon did was to string almost two thousand miles of telephone wire during the two campaigns to keep the different parts of the Division operating as a team. Joe simply did the best he could at the job he was given. And the wires did not grow naturally up there in those palm trees.

Joe recalled his initiation under enemy artillery fire. "The second day on Leyte we were laying wire from Division Headquarters forward to the 383d (Colonel May's) Regimental Headquarters. Off to our right on a hill, the Japanese wheeled out a gun and shelled us. Instead of getting down in a hole, I stood up and gawked around. Someone hollered, 'Get down, Joe.'

"About that time one of our 105s opened up. I got down in a hole. Then I heard a voice say, 'I think Joe got it.' Not me, but George Tucci, our Company Clerk, was killed, our only battle casualty for both the Leyte and Okinawa campaigns."

The "Signal Communique", the company's newsletter, mentioned the Camilleri name in connection with an incident that happened at the end of the battle on Okinawa. Joe had been looking around the bivouac area trying to find the source of unusual noises he heard at night. When he glanced up the side of a cliff, he saw two feet sticking out of a burrow.

Joe shouted, "Jap!"

Men came running with an assortment of weapons.

A smoke grenade failed to flush the person, so he was dragged out feet first. The scrawny fellow was an Okinawan who had been hiding there all of the 16 days that Signal Company had been in the area.

The Army discharged Joe at Jefferson Barracks in January '46. He decided to go into the baking business when the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company bakery (A&P) offered him a job.

"I took time off for a trip back to Malta in 1948. My family and friends were talking about me still being unmarried. 'What are you waiting for?'

"A friend, Dominique, told me about his sister. He thought I might like her, so one evening I went to visit. The next day I go propose. First, the banns had to be announced in the Catholic Church. This was January and we were married on the 21st of February."

Four daughters were born to the Camilleris in Saint Louis. Joe worked at the A&P bakery until it burned and went out of business, then the family moved to California. Joseph Jr. was born there. Joe's union connections helped him find employment with Wonder Bread.

Together, Joseph and Jean (Americanized from Giovanna) visited Malta 14 times. Their travels took them all over North America and Europe, especially Lourdes, France, more than once toward the end of her life.

When the street that runs past the Camilleri acreage on the outskirts of Sonoma, California, needed a name, Joe and his neighbor, Charlie Grech, agreed on "Mosta Way". With this token to remind him of his hometown so far away, Joe is proud to be a naturalized American citizen, but most of all, a DEADEYE to the bone.

Recognition of Deadeye accomplishments came in a letter from

the late Lt. Gen. Simon Buckner to Gen. Bradley. "I wish to congratulate you and all members of your command for your part in driving the ene-my away from his Shuri line and forcing him to the present area for final destruction. While all the divisions in the line have contributed to this end, I regard the capture of Conical Hill by the 96th division as the most important single factor in the col-lapse of the Shuri position, since it opened the way for the envel-opment of the hostile right and forced the enemy's immediate withdrawal.",

Kill 20,000 Japs

By mid-June, official estimates credited the Deadeyes with killing 20,000 Japs, the biggest bag of any division on the Island, but the price was highest of any XXIV corps division. Only two or three survivors remain in some of the original platoons left from Leyte. More than one com-pany lost all its officers; one company has had seven com-manders; one regiment has had

Somewhere on the Internet I came across your name as a connection to the 96th Division Association. As we veterans of the fighting on Leyte and Okinawa are getting older we are becoming fewer, too. I'd like to make some kind of connection. I don't promise to come to large roundups because I am not much of a social animal but I'd like to, if possible, find some old friends.

I was a platoon leader and executive officer in the 382nd Inf. Regiment. Those of us who took those raw - how very raw - recruits in at "Swamp Adair" can't be a very large number any more. My last connection was many years ago with Capt. Walter Trott in Connecticut, I think. I called the last known address of my friend, platoon sergeant and first Sargeant, Charles Pozzini, in Stillwater, MN only to find he had died just a few months before. That discourages correspondence.
