Three Shared a Shell Hole, a Bullet, and a Reunion

McCarthy and Bowman had sometimes wondered whatever happened to whats'isname

You can bank on it. For one reason or another the old infantryman allows a lot of stuff to slip his mind, but certain info stays to become indelible. Ask him his serial number, or, if he got hit, when, where, date, and time. If he is in the mood, prepare to be amazed.

The brew was flowing and foaming at the DEADEYE 2000 Beer Bust in Salt Lake City, Utah. Dick McCarthy, who Was relaxing with friends at one of the tables for Company B of the 383rd, overheard a new man in the group mention the date of May 24, 1945. Jim Reineck was telling a frightful story about a certain happening on Charlie Hill - why he had been unable to breathe through his nose for the past 55 years and so on.

That sparked McCarthy 's memory. He and this guy Reineck had been carrying around different versions of their own war story. And the story involved Arvin Bowman, too, Ho wever none of the three had actually known either of the other two by name. Here, still above grass, is the missing man in their close up and personal brush with death. Remember May 24, 1945? This was an especially desperate day and time. The entire 96th Infantry Division was running out of men in a battle that had already lasted weeks longer than the strategists planned for. Company B was down to platoon strength of a round 40 men from its original T/O of somewhere close to 200. The lack of replacements besides nearly two weeks of continual rain through the middle of the month had stalled the attack everywhere. The troops wallowed in mud, meantime forward positions did not change much. Then the weather cleared up.


The word from Captain John Van Vulpen was that Company B was going over the hill this time ("- you plan to stay there!"). A couple of hours ago everyone had been pulled back out of the way of Marine planes that were supposed to soften up the place. Now the company began moving south across the forward slope of Charlie Hill. The Japanese did noL start shooting until several men were out in the open and exposed on bare ground - such was their usual tactic lately.

This day Arvin Bowman's job in the attack was or had been scout. Since coming to the company as one of the first but few replacements, his experience amounted to less than two weeks. "I and another guy were out ahead further down the hill when a spray of bullets started kicking up ground around me. I turned and stumbled into a hole, without a scratch." James (Jim) Reineck found himself in the infantry at Camp White, Oregon, when ASTP closed out. Illness kept him hospitalized when his company departed Leyte, P.I., for the assault on Okinawa. He caught up with them three weeks later on; combat had taken its toll, many old faces were gone. Being a rifleman today he was supposed to protect the demolitionsmen while they took care of business. He heard some scattered machine-gun fire though nothing close. Then something hit his jaw. BONG! He could not know the damage at the moment, but a bullet had gone clean through his face. "Whether by impact or instinct I hit the dirt. , Blood was dripping on my hands arid I realized that I had better find cover, so I crawled towards a shell hole."



ONE MACHINE-GUN BULLET WOUNDED both McCarthy and Reineck at the same time in the same shallow shell hole. Bowman escaped from that hole with only a bad case of jitters.

Instead of a shell hole, what Jim found was a saucer-like crater with a man (Arvin) stretched out in it hugging the bottom. And the lay of the land caused the crater to cant in the direction of Love Hill from where the bullets were coming. Tought luck. "I piled in behind him."

Next came Richard (Dick) McCarthy. He, with two or three others, had managed to set off a satchel charge to close a cave. Alone now, Dick noticed two men (Arvin and Jim) over to his right, both laying flat. "The guy who saw me coming started yelling, '*!#@O!!-you'll draw fire in here!'. There was nowhere else to go."

The three men from Company B scrunched together belly-to-butt while another volley of bullets snapped at the rim of their hiding place. The gunner had his target sure enough. Right then one and the same 6.25mm slug grazed Arvin, tore through Jim's thigh close to his pelvis and out through his buttock, nicking Dick's penis before finally lodging in his leg.

Arvin bailed out, no more encouragement required. "I headed back up the hill to get behind a spur. There was some commotion going on about how to bring in our wounded. A mortar squad was setting up to fire its remaining few rounds of smoke."

Dick made a break, clearing the hole in a single bound. "When that bullet came in ${\bf 1}$ had to get out."

Jim did not have the guts to feel his face or jaw. He was afraid that walking or running might not be possible and he was not about to try standing up. Maybe better wait until dark then crawl to a safer place.

While he pondered, an exploding smoke shell splattered his back with incendiary material and set him aflame. Despite his wounds, Jim ran up the hill screaming all the way. Arvin and Donald Oberlander grabbed him and smothered the fire with a fatigue jacket.

ARVIN BOWMAN CAME TO Company B on Okinawa straight out of basic training. Be really did noL know where he was going until he got there.





At our Denver Reunion I heard about a book written by an Okinawan woman who survived our invasion. At that time she was 5 years old. As we moved our front lines down the island, she and her two older sisters sought refugee toward the south end of the island. In the confusion of refugees she was separated from her family, and was forced to proceed alone. Sleeping in caves in the daytime, she moved only at night. The abandoned farm lands provided her with raw food. She eventually surrendered herself and was taken to a refugee camp where she was reunited with her sisters. She is now married and works as a lawyer.

As I read the book I could not help but feel that I had walked on the same roads on which she had walked, and crossed the same fields from which she picked vegetables, and looked into the caves in which she slept. It is an inspiring story of childhood tenacity under the worst conditions.

The book is entitled THE GIRL WITH THE WHITE FLAG by Tomiko Higa. It is published in Tokyo and is distributed in the United states by Kodansha America, Inc. 575 Lexington Ave. New York, 10022.
