



DIRECTIONS

FROM THE NORTH

From Bartlesville, take Highway 75 South until you come to 1-244 West. Take 1-244 West to First Street exit, West on First Street to Cheyenne, South (eft) on Cheyenne to Second Street, East (left) onto Second Street. The Adam's Mark Hotel is one (1) block up on Second Street.

FROM THE SOUTH

Take Highway 75 North. Do not take the Broken Arrow/75 North exit when you reach it, instead take the Seventh Street exit which is immediately ahead. Take Seventh Street until you reach the fork in the road which separates Sixth and Seventh Streets. Go to the left and take Sixth Street to Boulder. Turn Left onto Boulder to Second Street. The Adam's Mark Hotel is one (1) block up on Second Street.

NOTE: Most Streets in the Downtown Area are One Way Streets.

FROM THE EAST (two ways)

- Take Highway 51 (Broken Arrow Expressway) to Downtown. Take the Denver/Cheyenne exit. At the bottom of the exit, turn onto Denver Street. Turn right onto Second Street and The Adam's Mark Hotel is three (3) blocks on the right.
- 2) Coming from Joplin, MO, exit the turnpike on Highway 44 West. Take that to where it splits and take 1-244 West (also marked as Downtown Tulsa). Take 1-244 to First Street exit. West on First Street to Cheyenne, South (left) on Cheyenne to Second Street, East (left) on Second Street. The Adam's Mark Hotel is two (2) blocks up on Right.

FROM THE WEST (two ways)

- 1) From Oklahoma City, exit off Turner Turnpike to 1-244 East. Take I-244 East to Highway 75 North. Take Highway 75 North until you come to Seventh Street exit. Take Seventh Street until you reach the fork in the road dividing Sixth and Seventh Streets. Go to the left and take Sixth Street to Boulder. Turn left onto Boulder. Take Boulder to Second Street. Turn right onto Second Street and the Adam's Mark Hotel is one (1) block up on the right.
- NOTE Most Streets in the Downtown Area are One Way Streets
- From Wichita, exit from Cimmaron Turnpike to take Highway 64 East. Take Highway 64 into Downtown Tulsa and take Second Street exit. The Adam's Mark Hotel is five (5) blocks on the right.

FROM THE AIRPORT

Take Highway 11 East until you come to I-244 West. Take I-244 West to First Street exit. West on First Street to Cheyenne, South (left) on Cheyenne to Second Street, East (left) on Second Street. The Adam's Mark Hotels is two (2) blocks up on the right.

TRANSITION COMMITTEE MEETS:

Following our annual reunion that was held in Kansas City, the Transition Committee held a short meeting to determine the next course of action following the action on the floor of the membership meeting. It was clear that we should proceed with the establishment of a repository for our memorabilia as well as a non-profit, tax-exempt corporation for purposes of perpetuating the legacy of the 96th Infantry Deadeye Division and its contributions to the safety of the United States citizens. The issue of setting a date for the final meeting of our Reunion Association was tabled by vote of the membership.

The Transition Committee, at its own expense, did meet in Salt Lake City in late September. We retained the services of an attorney to work with our attorneys and our Transition Committee members. The content of proposed Constitution and By-Laws was discussed in detail. The incorporating papers were also reviewed and and discussed. The revision of these papers is an ongoing process and will be completed just prior to our Tulsa annual meeting in July, 2003. As per the instructions of the members, who approved this process in principle, these documents will be submitted to the membership for final adoption. Only then will the document filing process be instituted. That should not take much time and we will soon be in a position to further promote our repository at Ft. Douglas.

Naturally, the Transition Committee discussed the tabling action on the issue of scheduling a final reunion under the auspices of our present corporation. The debate on the floor was emotional and that atmosphere was considered by the committee. There are a number of ways in which to solve the dilemma and we are working on ideas to do just that.

The options are still all there and a new one is in the thinking process. The proposed new non-profit corporation could include a broad widening of membership interested in preserving the legacy of the Division. Sons, daughters and even members of the public interested in our legacy could be part of the new organization. Its central purpose would be to preserve the legacy. Annual meetings of the future Board could include gatherings of old-time members of the 96th as well as their descendants. Those gatherings would be a scaled-down version of the reunions as we know them today.

The whole matter is still open for discussion. I urge everyone to keep their minds open and be prepared to rationally discuss the issues in Tulsa.



LOVE COMPANY BOOK ANNOUNCEMENT

Love Company is the factual account of a young U.S. Army Infantryman's experiences serving in a front line Rifle Company during the battles of Leyte and Okinawa. The trials and triumphs of his unit, Company L, 382nd Infantry Regiment, 96th Infantry Division are faithfully detailed as his outfit meets the enemy in the swamps and jungles of Leyte and then on the fire-swept hills and ridges of Okinawa. During the course of these battles, Love Company, which landed 187 men on Leyte, suffers over 300 battle casualties. The few surviving battle-wise veterans and a steady stream of replacements heroically carry the fight to the Japanese until the end of the fighting on Okinawa, the last battle of World War II.

Everybody got all shook up

"This generation has a rendezvous with destiny," President Franklin Roosevelt declared in his speech accepting renomination for president in 1936. He was hoping to inspire a populace which languished in the economic malaise of the Great Depression. Among the listeners to his fireside chat on their radios were the thousands of fuzzy-faced teenage boys destined to make up the bulk of the Ninety Sixth Infantry Division, though at the time World War Two and the draft were too far ahead to imagine.

That was then; however within the next few years, everything changed. The division was as prepped as it could ever be. Deadeyes were all set and ready to go fight their battles. Destiny awaited somewhere to westward and Camp Stoneman was a stopover.

At Camp Stoneman any last minute items were being handled in a routine way that was both quick and final before the units - shipment code numbers only - were to board the ferry for transportation to the troopships.

As it happened, literally, everybody got all shook up.

Close to 10:18 P.M. on the moonless and breathlessly quiet night of Monday, July 17, 1944, disaster struck Port Chicago. According to persons who

> THE PORT OF EMBARKATION FOR San Francisco and Oakland was Camp Stoneman which was located at Pittsburgh about 10 miles upriver from Port Chicago. As far as soldiers of the 96th Infantry Division were concerned it was land's end while they "staged" in secret for shipping out. "Staging" was Army talk for assembling and processing troops, everything crowded into three days.

were outdoors at Stoneman the first sign was a bright yellowish-orange glow which appeared to sweep from one horizon to the other across the sky in a matter of seconds. Next came a powerful shock wave, something like an earthquake though more intense together with a low rumbling far down deep in the earth-that lasted too long.

It was no earthquake. The double-deck barracks wobbled on their foundations. Broken window glass and ceiling materials showered down on men who were sleeping in their bunks.

In an instant, everybody now fully awakened, startled, wondering what in the world could raise such ruckus: "...have the Japs come here?"

Thank goodness there was no follow-up "attack".

Jangled nerves demanded action so some parts of the division were put on the alert for the remainder of the night. Only medics were trucked to Port Chicago where they practiced treating casualties. Without interruption the SOP processing at Stoneman resumed early on Tuesday.

Rumor and fact became confused. Few of the troops had ever heard of Fort Chicago and nobody had any knowledge about the goings on over there. That was not until after the explosion.

In fact, two ships were involved in the horrific blast. The Quinalt Victory was a brand-new vessel that had just been cleared for loading of ammunition and bombs. On the other side of the pier, the E. A. Bryan, a Liberty type just over 440 feet long with five holds, each as deep as a four-story build-

ing, had been loading since the 13th. The ship had already taken on some 4,200 tons, about half of its scheduled load, and another 430 tons of bombs and projectiles waited to be stowed.

Evidently a smaller explosion did occur on the pier just before the E. A. Bryan blew up like one giant bomb. Smoke and debris climbed maybe twelve thousand feet into the night sky, with hundreds of exploding shells making it look like a huge fireworks display.

Very little of the E. A. Bryan wreckage ever found could be identified. The Quinalt Victory was tossed into the air where it turned around and settled back upside down. Everything on the 1,200-foot-long pier, including a locomotive and its boxcars, disintegrated. All of the 300 homes and most of the business buildings in the town of Port Chicago were wrecked to some extent.

All 320 men on the two ships and a fire barge were killed instantly. Of those, as few as 51 bodies were enough intact to be identified. A Naval Court of Inquiry later put down the disaster as an accident.

Within only two days following the explosion at Port Chicago the Ninety Sixth Infantry Division was gone from Camp Stoneman. On the sunny afternoon of their leaving, the troop's ferryboats glided past the scene of the worst homefront disaster of World War Two. Calm waters of the bay hid the evidence save a pile or two of scrap steel plates and a few battered piling.

Deadeyes recall traumatic event with explosive torce equivalent to five tons of TNT, the blast was on the same order of magnitude as the atomic bomb that would be dropped on Hiroshima a year later.

ALVIS HARRELL C-321 Med 717 Sales Road Mt. Vernon, IL 62864 From his induction into the Army in October '42 through wounding in May '45 Larry experienced the travails of his outfit. This violent episode of nearly three score years ago turned out to be a mere sideshow for his time in the military.

"There were only about three of us in the barracks. I was sacking out on my cot - the shaking reminded me of one of those old-time beds where you put in a quarter.

"Later when we went down the river on the ferry, I could not see much. I thought there would be a big hole, but if there was, it was full of water."

"I and my buddy were dancing with the local gals at a USO Club party. At the time of the explosion, the lights swayed back and forth then went out. Probably two minutes later the lights came back on and the dance continued for another half an hour,

"Everything was calm when we got back to the company, so we went to bed. No sweat.

"Then a whistle blowed and we were ordered to fall out with full-field packs and on the double. After lolling around until somewhere close to midnight we were dismissed to go back to bed."

Bucky's vignette does not represent more than a preliminary in contrast to a far, far more desperate day on Okinawa when he ended up wrapped in a poncho and ready for burial in the 96th Infantry Division Cemetery. That was another story. Over the years since then he has accumulated 47 grand, great grand and great, great grandchildren, yet another story.


Alvis was just another GI who managed to endure while storing up a raft of indelible memories. Postwar, he became a licensed funeral director and embalmer. The Port Chicago explosion left its mark, though.

"We had just arrived at Camp Stoneman that afternoon. I was bunked upstairs in one of those wooden barracks. Suddenly an awful noise came, then the ceiling started falling. Some windows blew in. Someone ran in hollering, 'There's a plane flying over...we're being bombed!' All of us, pell-mell, outside, jumped in those gullys (drainage ditches). Nobody gave orders. We were long gone. Afterwards, we did not hear much about it."


