

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

OUR YOUNGER GENERATION SPEAKS OUT

WHAT ARE YOU MARCHING FOR? By Ty Finke



The 4th of July has always been an important date in my family life. While I was growing up, my parents instilled in me a love of patriotic history by teaching me heroic Civil War stories of Robert E. Lee, and his horse, Traveler; Stonewall Jackson at the 1st Battle of Bull Run, and Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain on Little Round Top. Some may question the motives behind me hearing stories of war and death at such a young age. My parents, however, wanted me to learn about honor and integrity and duty to one's county so that I could grow up with an appreciation for the sacrifices that had been made so that I could live in freedom. Consequently, one patriotic song that has always been important to me is a song in which John Wayne asked "what are you marching for?" Every year I ponder this question from a new angle, and this year, my thoughts turned to the 96th Division. "What are you marching for?"

When the new 96th Division was officially incorporated into the wartime Army of the United States on August 15th, 1942, General Bradley told you what you were fighting for. He said you were going to be "well trained, tough physically and mentally, ready and eager to fight, not for our personal glory or advancement but for the honor of the division and the service of our county." You achieved the goals he set for you in many ways.

The war is long over, and the army has scattered, but the group of well trained, tough, eager, selfless, patriotic men remains connected by annual reunions like this one where you meet old friends, sound and whole. Overall, some of the most important people you have are each other. Men of the 96th Division, the Deadeyes, you will always have each other because you fully understand the impact the war left on your lives. You are the only ones who understand that in the heat of battle, it was no longer the cause that mattered. You marched for the man on your left. You marched for the man on your right. As the world around you shrank in those chaotic moments, they were what mattered.

My grandpa, Mr. Joseph Marlenga of Company A, 383rd Infantry out of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, told me a few stories of his friends. His friends meant a lot to him and he was devastated to come back home with so few who truly understood. He told me a story of the night he spend in a trench. With a dead Japanese soldier who he had beat to death with the butt of his rifle simply to ensure his own survival. For those of you who had the privilege to know my grandpa, you know that he was a gentle, mild mannered man. Yet he survived. Due to haunting images that was left on my grandpa's mind, he didn't often share his war experiences. Now that he's entered his life in heaven, I am grateful for the few, but precious stories he did tell me. Stories of bravery and patriotism that I will pass on to my children someday. I will tell them, and they will understand that his stories are not to be forgotten. The 96th Division is not to be forgotten.

In preparation for my time with you today, I spent some time looking at some information about the 96th Division. As I turned pages, my eyes lingered upon the faces of many brave men each of which have their own stories to tell. Although every picture had it's own unique glow, it was a much stronger light that bound each picture together for a common purpose. The fire of patriotism was burning in the eyes of every soldier in every one of those pictures. As I glanced around the room today, I am honored to look into the burning eyes of those same soldiers. I know this not because we are here at the 96th Division Reunion. No, I know this because as I connect eyes with you, and you, and you I see that same flame flickering in your eyes. The flame of patriotism continues to illuminate your souls. As your fellow torchbearers pass away, you can keep their light flickering by telling your stories to people you care about. After all, where would we be without each and every one of you? What would our lives be like? I don't know what it's like to go through what you went through. I don't know what goes on in a soldier's heart as he is facing the enemy. You do. And because of that, I may never have to know the pain of those things. Thank you.

Abraham Lincoln spoke of the soldier's greatest comfort in Gettysburg Address. "We will not long remember what we say here, but we can not forget what they did here." We will never forget. I will never forget.

I will admit it - I shared a few tears with my grandpa as he told me his stories, but that wasn't all he shared with me. He gave me a piece of his heart. A piece for me to hold on to and to spread out, to keep him and his friends from the 96th Division living forever. It's up to my generation to keep your flames burning. So that when I get to heaven and I see my grandpa I can ask him, "Did I make you proud?" Hoping that maybe, I had grown up to be the woman in who he can see those pieces of his heart shining through.

As my children grow up, I plan on helping them to understand the importance of days such as the 4th of July, when thoughts can drift to what their purpose in life is. What am I marching for? At this moment, I am marching for my grandpa, because I know he would want me to give you the following message. As tonight comes to a close, and things with the 96th Division change, let the light of patriotism continue to burn in your hearts. Take a long look at the person to your left. Take a long look at the person on your right. They are who you are marching for.

My earliest recollection of the 96th Infantry Reunions is of a small trinket that my parents brought home to me from Kansas City in 1960 when I was just 9 years old. I personally attended 3 reunions in Chicago, Minneapolis and Denver before I was married and moved into another phase of my life as a wife, mother, AND a daughter.

While growing up around the 96th reunions, I met many of my dad's buddies and as a result, I became a member of the K Company, 383rd family who include many who are here tonight and many more who are no longer with us.

Because of the stories, camaraderie, caring and yes, TRUE LOVE shown by the members of my dad's unit, I learned about a time that I did not experience and a conflict that I did not understand.

My son, Thomas, was born in 1982 and has, all his life, sat with his "Grandpa Bill" always interested in his experiences in the army and his perspective as a rifleman and a platoon sergeant on Leyte and Okinawa. One of Tom's favorite things was to put on Grandpa's dress uniform and admire the ribbons and insignia.

Tom decided his senior year in high school to join the military. My dad's only advice to him was, "the Navy always has a bed", and, for heaven's sale! Don't join the Marines!" Tom *chose* the Army, and *requested* the Infantry, mostly because he wanted to carry on his grandpa's legacy, but also as a personal challenge. He entered basic training as a brash, cocky, self-confident, dramatic and occasionally irresponsible 18 year old boy. He came out a changed man. I remember asking him after graduation at Ft. Benning, GA, just when he lost his "smart alec" attitude? He replied, "Pretty much the first 10 minutes I was there!"

Tom is currently a specialist with the 101st Airborne Air Assault Division out of Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. He is a SAW gunner assigned to the 1st of the327th, also know as, the Bastogne Bulldogs. Before he left for Iraq in March, the Division needed machine gunners to fill in as volunteers on the helicopters due to a shortage of qualified heavy weapons experts. He spent from March 20 to May 1 as a door gunner/crew chief on a Chinook helicopter flying 34 combat missions. He has since been reassigned back to his infantry unit and is now working somewhere around Mosul in northern Iraq.

The family that began as K Company, 383rd, has now become "the guys" of the 96th Division, the wives, sons and daughters, and on and on... The letter I am about to read to you was written by Tom to Herman and Helen Buffington, members of 383rd, K Company and part of ALL of our extended family. Now that the torch is about to be passed to another generation, my hope is that this letter will give you all comfort in knowing that those who come after you understand your passion for each other and why these reunions have mean't so much to all of us.

Dear Mr. And Mrs. Buffington,

Please excuse my spelling and handwriting. I am writing this inside a helicopter with a flashlight, so please bear with me. I was very pleased to get your letter and I want you to know that it was the first one I have seen since I've been here. Anyway, I want you to know Sir, that if there is one man I look up to and admire in my life it is my grandfather, and if there is one man that he looks up to and loves it is you, Sir. I have heard many tales and stories about you since I was just a kid in school. You are a very special man, just like all the men who served in the War.

War today is not fought like it was back then, and sometimes courage, honor and brotherhood has been replaced by computers, politicians, and money. But there are a few of us who recognize what you outstanding men and soldiers did for us so many years ago and know that it still haunts you today, just as the pain and suffering of a people I've never seen before does to me over here. No one will ever know what it was like for you men over there and thanks to your sacrifice and patriotism we are safe and free. I hope the new generation Army does you proud and lives up to your expectations.

Thank you for your letter and your support. Please write to me as much as you can, and Ma'am, thank you for supporting your husband and the boys in World War II, just as my wife does for me and us now.

Your generation is probably the most incredible and wonderful one of our time. Thank you for all you have done for us in making this world closer to peace and we will take it from here and hope to do as good a job as you did.

From myself, the men of the 101st Airborne Air Assault Division, and the United States Army, thank you for your valor and integrity. Men and soldiers like you are scarce these days and you truly are the heart and soul of America. I am truly proud to follow your path. **DEADEYES LEAD THE WAY**.

There are very few times in life when one has the opportunity to make a difference, to make the world a better place and to leave a legacy for future generations. Yet that is precisely what the men of the 96th Infantry Division did. In an era where heroes were a fact of daily life, at a time when men and women throughout the world were making sacrifices of epic proportion, these men distinguished themselves as few before or since.

Exemplifying the highest traditions of United States military service, the men of the 96th Infantry Division received that rarest of honors, the Presidential Citation for Extraordinary Heroism. As one of only a very few units ever so recognized, the 96th Infantry Division gave everything they had for their country and for the principles it represents. From Leyte to Okinawa, their spirit and love of country was unswerving throughout the Second World War. Since then, they have time and again demonstrated that same patriotism in their many acts of quiet charity and in their dedication to each other and to the honor of their comrades who made the ultimate sacrifice.

It is time, at long last, to honor and to thank the men of the 96th Infantry Division. Their pride, their sense of honor and patriotism, made the world a better place. They did that noblest of deeds: they sacrificed their personal safety, indeed their very lives, to defend the principles we hold dear. For that, and for the love and generosity they shared with their country and with their families, it is time to honor them and commit ourselves to their legacy of duty, honor and country, to the freedom they defended for us and for future generations.

But we need the help of the men themselves to do this. It is my hope that the men of the 96th will do one more important thing for their families and for their country. Rather than simply keeping the spirit of the 96th Infantry Division to themselves, I hope that they will seize this opportunity to share it and spread it: to use the 60th anniversary of Leyte and Okinawa as the fitting time to end the formal business of the 96th and thereby pass the torch to a new generation. In so doing, they will allow their families and the country they fought to defend, the long overdue opportunity to recognize their achievements and to commit ourselves to our fathers' spirit of patriotism and sacrifice.

You can go on as before and allow the organization to dwindle and die.

Or you can make sure its spirit lives on forever.

Because I love my father and all of you who did so much for our country, I care about your legacy. With your help, we can make sure it lives forever.





AWARD OF THE PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION BADGE

By direction of the President, pursuant to paragraph 19 1, Section II, Armed Forces of the Philippines Regulations G 131-052, this Headquarters, dated 24 April 1967, as amended, the PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION BADGE is hereby awarded to

96TH INFANTRY DIVISION UNITED STATES ARMY

for acts and services of exceptional gallantry and heroism rendered by its officers and men during the Leyte Campaign, from 20 October 1944 to 1 March 1945. The 96th Infantry Division landed with General Douglas MacArthur in Leyte on 20 October 1944. Capturing the critical terrain of Catmon Hill which was fiercely defended by elements of the 16th Infantry Division of the Imperial Japanese Army, the Division advanced through deep swamps and penetrated to Tubon-Tubon which was heavily infested by the enemy. After four days of attack, counterattack and heavy losses of personnel and equipment, the Division succeeded in defeating the enemy. Again, in December 1944, the Division participated in the counterattack against the 2nd Parachute Brigade, Imperial Japanese Army which was then assault-ing the airfields and supply depots in Central Leyte Valley. By these achievements, the 96th Infantry Division, United States Army, greatly contributed to the success of one of the decisive battles of World War II and earned the lasting admiration of the Republic of the Philippines and its people.






Okinawa Battle Map No. 1




The Fate of 1st Platoon, Co. L, 382nd Infantry on Okinawa







Diorama in Fort Douglas Museum honors Deadeyes

Meet Richard Heindel, Architect and Artist


The H. Richard Heindel story is that of a son who never had a chance to know his father who was killed in the war. And the father, Harold L., would never know about his son's outcome. Richard is the father of seven children, widely recognized in his profession and with yet one more way to honor his family name by making a memory come almost alive in a museum.

Harold L. Heindel's draft number came up in the summer of 1944 when good men were hard to find anywhere around Idaho Falls, Idaho. Married and with two kids, he nearly missed the train that would haul him to Fort Douglas, Utah, for induction. The goodbyes to his family were not easy.

Harold's 13-weeks basic training at Camp Fannon, Texas, readied him for shipment overseas by Christmas Day of '44. In Hawaii, jungle training and amphibious training were piled on before the long voy-

age to Leyte Island where he was assigned as a replacement rifleman to Company C of the 382d Regiment, 96th Infantry Division.

The company was still short-handed when its convoy of LSTs headed north for an Easter Sunday rendezvous with the Japanese enemy on Okinawa. Private Heindel was killed in action May 10, 1945, in the shadow of Zebra Hill, just south of Kochi. That end to his brief and brutal combat experience changed his family's lives forever.

Young Richard was soon to be five years old when the war took his father away. Today, so many years later, any remembrance of their lives together is sketchy. Richard's thoughts about World War Two became centered by the happening on a evening in June 1945 - his mother's reaction and his own childish inability to comprehend. "Mother and I were getting ready for bed. I had my pajamas on when the doorbell rang. She opened the door and a uniformed man was standing there. He handed her the telegram. It was what she thought it would be. Mother sat down on the arm of our easy chair, sobbing. That's what I remember - my mother's sorrow."

Testimony to the human cost of the three months-long battle were the 1,504 grave markers in two huge cemeteries. Harold Heindel was buried in the last row of the 96th Division Cemetery No. 1. Richard recalls that his mother's cousin who was stationed on the island shortly after the war, went to visit the grave. In a letter which he wrote, "The cemetery is very impressive...located between two small knolls and faces down to the East China Sea. It is beautiful with shrubs and wild plants all around. The neatness of the little white crosses made me kinda 'choke up'."

All of the military cemeteries on the islands in the Pacific were emptied out in the years following the end of the war. Harold's remains were returned to his next of kin, wife Darla, since married again. To Richard the memories of that homecoming have stayed fresh. "In 1949, when my dad's body was brought to Idaho, the military still provided escort even that many years after the war. We had a formal interment ceremony at Rose Hill Cemetery in Idaho Falls. A flag was draped over the coffin and there was a military salute with rifles firing. The officer in charge gave me the empty cartridges, also a blank that was not fired. As he presented me with the flag that covered my father's coffin he told me I should never forget the great sacrifice my dad had made for my country and for me and my family," Richard said."

Heindel went on to graduate from Idaho State College on his father's G.I. Bill entitlement. In those years the war in Vietnam was using up men fast. "I was in the R.O.T.C. program on my way to becoming a second lieutenant. One day a letter from the Army informed me my draft status was changed because my grandfather had had only one son and I was an only son, I would not be going anywhere," Richard said. "That kind of bothered me in a way and it still does now."

The relationship between the Association and the Regional Support Command (formerly A.R.C.O.M.) strengthened through the years after Anthony Pavell, president 1986 - 1987, went on his own, to be honored guest at their annual conference. Meantime, the 96th had been looking for a suitable place to display memorabilia which remained boxed up at a location in Oregon.

Donald Dencker, current historian, worked out an arrangement with the powers that be at Fort Douglas Museum to renovate a room by installing glass showcases. The 96th Infantry Division Association provided funds for the materials used in the project, the museum furnished labor and expertise, John Reed, an instructor in history at the University of Utah also a Lt. Colonel in the R.S.C., but not functioning as such, though maintaining contact with Brig. General Collins all the while.

Richard Heindel was titled Architect and Artist for the whole works.

What it all amounted to was a project of the 96th Infantry Division Association with some shared accountability and credit.

Fort Douglas Museum ready for visitors

The sandstone building in which the museum is housed was built in 1875. Its floors are layed out in stairstep fashion down the side of a mountain. On the downhill end of the building, visitors enter the Battle Display Room by walking down an incline which represents the open front-end ramp of a Higgins Boat (L.C.V.P.). That feature provides the illusion of landing on Okinawa, besides eliminating a hazardous stairs.

Recreated here is a glimpse of the primitive kind of warfare which was fought on Okinawa. Richard Heindel chose to portray his father as the stand-in for thousands of the 96th's soldiers who finally won the war in the old fashioned way by bellying up to the enemy amidst boulders on a ridge. The Display consists of four panels. Panel "A", map of the island with identifying landmarks. Panel "B", mural of part of Zebra Hill with a rifleman advancing up the hill on May 10, 1945. Kochi Ridge is in the midground and the hills are beyond. Panel "C", mural of Item, How, Easy, Charley, and Conical Hills. (The shelling of Conical Hill started about May 7, 1945. The main attack on Conical was on May 11.)

A detail not to be overlooked in this scene is the shattered tree with only three leaves on a twig. Richard explained that he had been painting on the mural late one night when something inside him told him to add three leaves to the tree. One leaf was to have a nick out of it, another was to be half of a leaf, and the third was to be a complete leaf.

The leaves which are not there are to honor those men who gave all they had to give. This Display and the Exhibit is homage to those who served on Okinawa, that they shall not be forgotten. Panel "D", panoramic photo of the Cornerstone of Peace, Okinawa.

Each of the panels measuring four feet by eight feet constitute a diorama of which the focal point is a life-size manequin rigged in equipment and clothing as if for an assault. The figure is outfitted realistically from the World War Two helmet on his head, a grenade in his shoulder harness, to the boots on his feet. He cradles a M-1 in hands which are specially sculpt to fit. His tired and glassy eyes search the devastated terrain

Enough said.

H. Richard is an architect and artist. He has designed a broad range of building types.
One which he enjoys is schools. He believes that schools, when properly designed, can provide a positive opportunity for youth and the community.

In 1997 he became a partner in a local firm and at the same time, managing architect for the Olympic Village which was to serve as housing for 4,000 athletes that competed in the 2002 Winter Olympics. For that purpose, during the final design phase, a portion of Fort Douglas was transferred to the University of Utah.

After Heindel met Donald Dencker, historian, in April of 2000, he became an associate member of the 96th Infantry Division Association. The following spring, April 2001, Richard accompanied Don's group on a tour of Okinawa, later on, Dencker called Heindel and asked if he would be interested in helping with the development of the Okinawa Exhibit at the Fort Douglas Museum.

Richard considered this to be the opportunity of a lifetime and immediately agreed to be part of the team which would put the project together.

Our daughters, Cathy, Lisa and Beth and myself have been determined, for many years, that he should be awarded this honor. He was wounded on June 2, 1945. He had three surgeries on his left hand. He was also wounded in his chest with his spoon being crumpled and a ring being broken.

There were five states represented at the presentation with approximately 30 family members and friends attending. I hardly knew Tom in 1945 but I am proud to be his wife of 54 years. We are both from the Tulsa area, so this was a great homecoming for our family.
