### 2018 ANNUAL MEETING First Annual Meeting of the New Deadeye Organization in Planning Stages

The dates and location for next year's annual meeting are in the planning stages. This new gathering will be an annual meeting of the newly merged organizations and it will include some informal, independent opportunities for socializing and entertainment.

It is hoped that, beginning in 2018, the board of the new organization will be able to host such a meeting either in the same place each year or in rotation with two or three other locations where we'll be able to partner with World War II historypreserving organizations. This might include an annual meeting conducted in Salt Lake City where the 96th Sustainment Brigade operates out of Fort Douglas.

## 96th Infantry Division Deadeye Association and Heritage Fund to be combined in 2018

The Board of Directors of the Deadeye Association voted to approve the merger with the Heritage Fund at the end of 2017.

The funds in the Deadeye Association will be transferred to the Heritage Fund. This is being done to reflect a change in the focus of our efforts, moving from a reunion centric organization to one that is focused on preserving the history of the 96th for future generations.

We will still have an Annual Meeting at a location nearby a museum that has historical information about the 96th. Affiliating with select key museums will be an important part of our efforts in preserving our history and building our Legacy.

All current members of the Deadeye Association will automati-

cally become Founding Sponsors of the Heritage Fund. There will be no membership dues although our Founding Sponsors will be given opportunities to donate money to our various programs that will be announced periodically. The Dispatch and our Web site

will continue to serve the needs of the Heritage Fund in communicating our plans and activities.

The Heritage is structured around a Board of Directors, Officers, Committees and Appointed positions. The Board has four members each of whom is also an Officer:

## Letter Seeking Information

#### Dear Deadeyes:

My name is Marcus Loganbill. My father, **Varden J. Loganbill**, was a medic with the 96th Division of the 383rd battalion landing on Okinawa on May 10 1945. He is 91 years old. After his time on the front lines (May 11 - June 27 1945) as a litter bearer and medic, he was admitted to the 74th field hospital due to tonsilitis.

After recovery he said he was transferred to the 83rd division (or maybe 86th). He has very rarely talked about his days in the Army or his experience on Okinawa. He did write a journal about his experience which I just discovered and read about three months ago thus sparking my interest in the Deadeye website.

I have been looking over the website with great interest. My father does not remember any names of people he was with and of course has no contact information. I don't know if there is a way to put his name out there and see if anyone would recollect serving with him.

He was at Fort Beale in California in March of 1945, then shipped up to Fort Lawton, Washington, then to Oahu and from there to Saipan and Okinawa.

I first contacted William Hill and he directed me to you suggesting that you might be able to post a message in the *Deadeye Dispatch*.

Thank you for perhaps steering me in the right direction to contact anyone who might remember serving with him.





## 96th Infantry Division Heritage Fund: Preserving the History

Background: The 96th Infantry Division has a history that reaches back to 1917 when it was initially formed during World War I and 100 years later continues its



legacy on today through the 96th Sustainment Brigade at Fort Douglas, Utah. While it would be informative to preserve all the 100 years of history, the initial focus will be on the Division's participation in World War II.

Situation: The purpose of the

96th Infantry Division Heritage Fund is to preserve the History of the 96th. A new History Committee will be formed to plan and execute what will be done annually to continue the work or preserving the 96th history. There are museums with infor-

mation and artifacts regarding the 96th's service during WWII. There are monuments in the US and overseas dedicated to the accomplishments of the 96th. Many of these monuments were funded by the 96th Deadeye Association and more recently by the Heritage Fund. There is a Web Site managed by the Deadeye Association that will soon be transferred to the Heritage Fund. There are links from the Web Site to various other sites that have information relative to the 96th Infantry Division.

Vision: Create a Virtual Museum on line that is the definitive resource for information on the 96th Infantry Division. Expand the number of artifacts and other information in Museums while creating a partnership with them so they can fully utilize our Virtual Museum within their own structure. Continue to dedicate monuments and plaques. Document more soldier stories. Increase the links with our web site. Expand the use of Facebook and other media.

The music of Glenn Miller, the Dorsey Brothers and so many more got Deadeyes and family members on their feet and onto the dance floor. The joint was jumping!

#### Saturday, July 29

Saturday began with the annual Memorial Service. This service is always an important part of our reunions, but this year it was even more poignant because the service was dedicated to Deadeye Glenn Stewart. Glenn served as chaplain for the Deadeyes for many years and, with his passing on May 2nd of this year, it seemed only fitting that the 2017 Memorial Service be dedicated to him in recognition of his service to the Association. So that's what was done and the service was conducted with fitting respect to Glenn and all the Deadeyes being remembered.

A lone bagpiper sounded the Association President Don call to service, Deadeye grandchildren welcomed

guests and the Minnesota Vietnam Veterans of America presented the colors in honor of their WWII brothers. Vocalist Heidi Satterberg performed beautiful renditions of traditional Deadeye music and Glenn Stewart's last message to the Deadeyes was

delivered by Deadeye Bob Schmidt's son-in-law Persoon. Jim Colonel Ken Beale shared his heartfelt keynote speech and all departed the service in silence, knowing that our departed veterans were being remembered with dignity and respect.

General Membership Meeting Following the Memorial Service, Deadeyes took a short break and then regrouped for the 2017 General Membership Meeting. This year's meeting focused on the big questions everybody's been asking: What happens next for the 96th Infantry Division Deadeye Association? Will reunions be discontinued? Most important: How will we make sure that the legacy of the Deadeyes lives on?

Klimkowicz presented the answers to all these questions

in a resolution approved by the Association Board for presentation to the general membership. This resolution was built on a document titled "A New Mission: 2017 and Beyond" that was presented to the Association in the Spring 2017 edition of the



Dispatch. This resolution formally recognizes the accomplishments and contributions of the Deadeyes. It also points the way to a new chapter in the life of the Deadeyes.

This new chapter provides for the formal merger of the 96th Infantry Division Deadeye Association with the 96th Infantry Division Heritage Fund. Such a merger is important because it will establish a non-profit entity that will now be focused solely on preserving the history and legacy of the Deadeyes. This resolution also provides for a new type

of gathering that will replace reunions. This gathering will instead be an annual meeting of this new organization. This annual meeting will be a one or two day event at which the official report of the Board's legacy building activities will be heard. Opportunities for socializing and supporting the

> legacy building mission of the organization will also be provided. This annual meeting will be organized and coordinated by the board of the merged organization and will be convened in locations that are easy to get to and, hopefully, in partnership with other

organizations who support our interests in preserving the history and legacy of World War II. Going forward, this sort of partnership with likeminded organizations will help us accomplish much more than we could on our own.

The resolution was approved unanimously by the membership and it is printed here for your review, along with preliminary plans for the first annual meeting of the newly merged organization which will take place in 2018. (See Page 7.)

Congratulations, Deadeyes, on taking this forwardthinking action to plan for the future of the organization!

96th Museum Project: Ft Douglas Museum, Salt Lake City, UT Or: How I Spent My Summer Vacation August 29-31, 2017 • Submitted by Joe Boyack



My idea in doing this was to determine the type and amount of material that the 96th Association actually has in storage at the museum in Ft Douglas and develop some suggestions for its future disposition.

Ft Douglas is designated as the official repository for all things related to the 96th Infantry Division and its successors by the U.S. Army Center of Military History (CMH). The Association has approximately 20 Banker Boxes worth of material relating to the 96th Division history and Association activities. The RRC and Sustainment Brigade also have material there consisting of an additional 30+ boxes. Most of the Division material is at the museum and some is being held by John Reed. John is working on providing us with an inventory of his items. John - I'll forward this list to Joe ASAP – it includes both original fragile documents (op orders, AARs, etc.), and a much larger cache of photocopies of docs from the National Archives.

There is also our reunion banner, PUC documents, flags and a number of other items including the TV/monitor that was presumed lost in action. The VCR is still MIA however. Not much of this material is currently very well organized or sorted since it was stored as received.

I have a list of the books and VHS tapes if anyone is interested and can forward on request.

#### What is being done with It

The museum has moved all of



Nearly all of the material owned by the Association consists of books, VHS tapes, documents, and photographs. This is a short list of what we have.

- 19 tapes relating to the Division history, monument dedication ceremonies, etc.
- · 40 book titles with a few duplicates of some titles. Some self published
- 10 scrapbooks donated by members photos and news clippinas

- Ladies' Auxiliary material 7 photo albums and several binders of financial reports and other records from 1962 thru 2005
- 3 very large scrapbooks in a wooden case
  - Baptism By Fire (Leyte)
- The Last Battle (Okinawa)
- The Reunions 1959 1980
- These consist of photos, news clippings, maps, copies of the Dispatch, all laminated.
- 2 name plaques Past Presidents, Distinguished Deadeyes
- Several different photo albums
- A large number of wartime Dispatches not a complete set
- 100-150 copies of 96<sup>th</sup> DVD produced by MG Cooke, covers Leyte & Okinawa
- A large number of assorted photographs, some from stateside training, some combat photos, some post-war, some reunion-related

our material from storage into one of the main buildings where they have started sorting, scanning, archiving and indexing it. The scanning will create digital copies of the material that anyone will be able to access. The archiving consists of placing the items in non-reactive plastic sleeves and/or acid free archival boxes for storage in a controlled environment. This is very important work that Tim Malone is doing pro bono. However, the Museum should be reimbursed for its materials costs, if not Tim's labor costs.

#### What Can We Do With It

There is no war-related material other than photos and documents - no physical objects such as uniforms, mess kits or anything of that sort. All of that type of material that is at the museum is either the property of the CMH or the State of Utah and as such we can do nothing with it, without a very elaborate "hand receipting" procedure for artifacts accountability that would go off the tracks as soon as a hand receipt holder becomes a casualty. This impacts the "traveling exhibit" question below.

I spent some time talking to Beau Burgess, the curator of the museum, and John Reed trying to get an idea of just what we could do with this material. Since there are no physical items to go along with the documents and photos it is very unlikely that any major museum is going to be interested enough to create some sort of display and if they did agree to accept it, it would likely just end up in storage somewhere. There might be some interest in the combat photos, although copies of most, if not all, of them probably are available through the National Archives. Correct. Also, John Reed has digitized all of the most important Leyte and Okinawa Signal Corps photos.

We also discussed the possibility of creating a "traveling exhibit" consisting of panels with photos and historical info that could be shipped to different museums for temporary display. There is probably a not insubstantial cost involved in creating and mainlining something like this as well as shipping back and forth. This would entail a lot of work which would have to be paid for, with a caveat that you get what you pay for.

The other option is a "Virtual Museum of the 96th". This seems to be the easiest and most cost-effective option. We already have an established web site and Facebook page. Setting everything up in a suitable format might require the help of someone with a good knowledge of web design in order to get things properly organized and to allow for easy maintenance and updating. There may already be someone in the membership that could help with that. A couple of people might be required initially to get things rolling, but once established it should not be too hard to maintain. We should probably have two or three people involved in that anyway just to spread the work load, especially if they



have full time jobs. I know there has been discussion of cross referencing or merging with the "Remember The Deadeyes" site maintained by Bill Hill and his daughter. Has anyone done anything to pursue this? John Reed completely concurs – the best way to memorialize the Deadeyes is to "hang" primary documents relating to their combat on Leyte and Okinawa on a website where folks can access them at their leisure indefinitely.

#### Random Thoughts & Observations

Once they found out that we were interested in actually doing something with all of the material that was in storage, the people at Ft Douglas really went to work to help us out. Most of the work of scanning and archiving the material is being done by one individual, Tim Malone. He has a Masters in Library Science and is a librarian for one of the local schools. He has worked at museums in Texas and is a trained archivist. He has been working as a volunteer at Ft Douglas for about three years and has acted as historian for another military unit (the 63rd ARCOM / 63rd Infantry Division) collecting oral histories, organizing rosters and digitizing a lot of their material, so he has a pretty good idea of what needs to be done. Once he got a look at our things he sort of adopted us as a project.

The museum is willing to do all of the grunt work (digitizing, archiving and



indexing) in getting our stuff organized, including the Association records and material, not just the warera things, and store it all. This is not a small undertaking as a lot of it is not currently well organized and is going to take some time and effort to straighten out. Beau Burgess is also going to create a donation request for 96th memorabilia that can be placed in the Dispatch, along with a 96th specific donation form which will state that if we ever find another organization to maintain the collection we are free to move it. They are really concerned that items of interest or value may be lost because families may dispose of things (read trash) because they don't know what else to do with them. This could also assist in collecting enough material for some worthwhile displays, especially if there is some history or story attached to the items.

#### Recommendations

My personal recommendation is that we leave the material at Ft Douglas, at least for the time being, and pursue the virtual museum idea. They are listed as the repository for 96th related material by the CMH. Everything is already there and they are putting a lot of work into getting it organized and manageable. Plus they are enthused about doing it and want to have the material there and available for display. If at some future time someone else expresses interest in what we have, we can discuss moving it.

I would like to suggest that the Association or Heritage Fund make two donations to the museum. One to the museum itself for storing and maintaining our material. This could also be an annual gift. The second would be to help defray the cost of the material needed to archive our items. I discussed this with Beau and he can do the research and come up with an actual estimate of the cost of these items, probably in the \$1,000 to \$2,000 dollar range.

I would also like to recommend some type of recognition for Tim Malone, the person who is doing most of the work. He is a volunteer at the museum and is not being compen-







sated in any way for his efforts. A letter of appreciation should be the least we can do, especially if it has a check attached.

I'm hoping that there will be time available during the board meeting to discuss some of this.



### How the "RememberTheDeadeyes" web site began

**BILL:** My daughter Janet Wharton and I were inspired to begin the website in 2006. We had just attended the great Denver reunion and I had already a few good Deadeye stories in hand. I felt they should in some way be saved for others to read. We kicked the idea around and decided to start a website just to see what we could come up with.

The website officially began on November 11, 2009; Veterans' Day. I started contacting some of my buddies in my company, collected all the stories I could and helped piece their stories together. I had already written my memoirs and I knew places and incidents pretty well.

At reunions, I gathered more details in our bull sessions, and great beer busts. I learned a lot from Don Dencker when I took the Valor tour to Okinawa.

My daughter Janet (a retired school teacher), knew more would be interested in our history and WWII if we provided peripheral information. Ideas popped in our heads and over eight years the site has grown and grown. Janet did the hard tech work for years and organized it into one of the most comprehensive military sites around. We drew a lot of information from many sources on the internet, history books, vets and many movies. After much research, we also provided the life stories of Generals Bradley, Easley, Buckner, and Vice Admiral Spruance.

We have subsequently helped hundreds of Deadeyes and their families by providing them with links to resources and posting stories of their loved ones. We have also researched and posted many tributes. We provided many links to all those interested in the history of WWII and helped preserve the legacy of the Deadeyes as a labor of love. There have been over 35,000 visits to the site in 7 years, and hopefully it has helped everyone remember our men and their sacrifices.

It is incumbent on all of us to encourage the gathering of even more Deadeye stories as time takes its toll.

The site is vested until 2024 and graciously supported by our parent organization; The 96th Infantry Deadeye Association.

Once a Deadeye, always a Deadeye, I am proud to be known by that name. It is the nickname of my old outfit, and deep down; we are all the same.

JANET: Our lives certainly changed at the Deadeye reunion in Denver. It was just after the dance; with all the exuberance of the reunion, Dad and I decided to start a website for the purpose of remembering the Deadeyes. I had no idea what all Dad had in mind. It took a while to get things started with what to name this website. We decided right off the he would supply me with articles and Army Life and I would use my technical skills to build this website. The purpose of the site would be to develop a site dedicated to remembering the Deadeyes. So. with that the rememberthedeadeyes.com/ website was born. Two years later on November 11, 2009. we went online.

Working with Dad was a challenge in the beginning, as we didn't speak the same computer language. At this point, he referred to the computer as "those guys." With time and patience on both our parts, he has come a long way. He now knows what to call each entry, such as the Index page is the same as the Home page; that links were the way to go from one page to another, our website to another, and lots of other new words. He works daily to gather more accurate information we can share. It was his idea to create the bulletin board to keep viewers of new information about what we were doing concerning the Deadeyes.

Dad was not the only one who was learning a new language. I had never understood the language of the military. There were so many terms, so much Army jargon and all those initials for things like BAR, CO, and LST. It was a foreign language which I had to learn. I had to constantly ask Dad to translate these into a term I understood. Thus, we created an Army glossary. There were so many basic ideas to learn and put into website form.

We made pages, even websites, under the RTC website. We posted stories and tributes sent to us by Deadeyes, or from his grieving family. We posted tributes for our soldiers so the family could send extended families to our site so they would know their Deadeye better. Families learned a whole new aspect of the Army life of their father, grandfather. Many had never spoken of their combat experiences.

We created comprehensive pages for Generals Buckner, Easley and Bradley and Admiral Spruance. We also have created pages for other people closely associated with Deadeyes, like Marjory Main and Ernie Pyle. The Queen of Battle page helps people understand the history of the Infantry. There are lots of other interesting pages. You just need to go there to understand the depth of each topic. The teacher in me developed the RTD Musette page to be a resource for teachers, parents and grandparents as they teach the next generations, And it sparks interested in the WWII era.





Several of Pacifican staff started out producing it 7 days a week in a musty old building, on desks sitting on dirt floors. The old presses had been used by the Japanese to print occupation money. There is a four-page copy of the Daily Pacifican in Bill's memoirs. He says it was a fond experience that he will always remember and cherish.






### "Okinawa Etched Deep in My Mind"
