He remembers good days and bad. He can tell about a Saturday night at the PX in Camp Adair, or re-live night guard in a fox hole in Okinawa.

He thinks once more of the men on his company roster who were left in hastily dug graves on Pacific Islands, and of others who will answer the roll call at the reunion.

Then the DEADEYE decides to renew his membership in the Association by signing in at the headquarters hotel in person.

96TH DIVISION ASSOCIATION MEETS APRIL 1, 1949

The DEADEYE'S of the Northwest held a meeting on the above date, at the Stadium Sports Center, 509 Pike Street, Seattle, Washington. Newspaper clippings and pictures will be at the Minneapolis reunion, this summer, for viewing. It was at this meeting that former Lt. Col. Richard Weisfield made a motion "To elect all men not present at the meeting. Officers of the 96th Division Association." The paper stated the next day that the Association must have at least 10,000 new officers. In attendance was PFC Ellery Scott, then a member of the 23rd Infantry Regt. of the Second Division. During World War II, he spent 38 months in the 96th, participating in all its action, and suffering critical gernade wounds four days before the end of the fighting on Okinawa. Said Scott: "Now the Second is a good division, but you should have seen the 96th during the war. Man, that WAS a Division." MINOR BUTLER ENTERS HINES HOSPITAL


