THE FEAR OF BEING ANONYMOUS


War is a peculiarly individual thing to an infantryman. No matter how many of his buddies are involved in combat alongside of him, he sees the action as a combination of vicious happenings that focus on him specifically. The dreadfulness of everything being ripped to smithereens on his little part of a ridge gives him a shock the likes of which probably has no comparison in this life. He suspects that he is being put on. Nothing is normal anymore as his world is riven in a crazy way and the best friends he will ever have become casualties.

He closes bravely with the enemy, but he carries along a resentful feeling that his struggle is going unappreciated and unnoticed. He decides that he is very much alone and forgotten in his predicament. It never leaves him, even as he forces himself to put one foot in front of the other - the fear of anonymity.

In the midst of this, he perceives that he is a participant in a great event and wistfully wishes to be remembered for having been there. But fate removes him to his home country, far from those desperate scenes that, except in his dreams, he will not experience again. And he is thankful.

The passage of years and the quirks of international politics give the old infantryman a perspective from which to look back and wonder at the worth of his effort and the enormity of the cost. In a remote part of the world, on the island of Okinawa, he and his buddies will be leaving only two permanent symbols, one to honor a famous Texan by the name of Claudius M. Easley and another for a dedicated soldier called Edwin T. May. Those monuments will also serve to call to mind that long roster of men of the 96th who knew the fear, but dared to be anonymous.




Presenting. The Contemporary Stylings of Chuck Howard & His Orchestra

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY

The Association came into ownership of the Bradley plaque and it was transported to our annual reunions for several years. We tried to locate the person who was responsible for carving the work of art, but our clues were scant. For one thing, we incorrectly made out the name scratched on the front lower right hand corner of the plaque "K.E. Lihkuhn - 1942". We failed to find Kurt Litzkuhn at that time.

Officers of the Association decided that the plaque deserved to be pres-greatly enlarged snapshot (Bradley erved in a permanent home, so arrangements were made for the City of Rolla, Missouri, hometown of Gen. Bradley, to be the recipient.

The plaque has remained on prominent display in the public library since October 23, 1971.

Whereabouts of the other plaques have not been discovered.

Kurt Litzkuhn: PRIVATE WHO CHISELED GENERALS

THE REST OF THE STORY By Ed Dakan (381-B)

Armed with mallet and chisel Pvt. Kurt Litzkuhn did quite a bit of his soldiering in a sideroom of the unfinished officers club at Camp Adair. That was during the basic training days of the 96th. While other rookies were learning skills with infantry weapons and pulling guard and KP, one private was permanently detailed to chisel the generals. Yes sir! He had been assigned to turn pieces of mahogany. plank into beautiful plaques.

His subjects were Maj. Gen. James Bradley, Commanding General, Brig. Gen. Paul Kane, Division Artillery Commander and Brig. Gen. Claudius Easley, Asst. Division Commander. The hustle and bustle of training routine of the new division did not stop the generals from looking in on the private, giving him a chance to observe facial expressions and take measurements.

First, Pvt. Litzkuhn completed the larger-than-life portrait of Gen. Bradley. Kurt worked from a was pleased with the final result). The plaque of Gen. Kane was second to be done (Mrs. Kane complained about his large ears). Kurt's main reference for the Gen. Easley plaque was a picture of him making a speech (how to close his mouth was a problem).

Each plaque required about two weeks time from start to finish. Day after day, through weekends and late at night - tap...tap...tap. The second looie who was supposed to have an office in the same room with Pvt. Litzkuhn was going crazy.

At last! No more tap...tap...tap.
The job was done. There was an unveiling and presentation ceremony. Gen.
Bradley asked for his picture to be taken with Pvt. Litzkuhn.

Kurt re-joined his buddies and stayed with Division Artillery HQ until after the Yakima maneuvers. Then his time came for leaving. The Division was getting in shape for a fight and Litzkuhn was 44 years old when younger hotbloods were needed.

The generals went off to war and the private left the Army and went back to Chicago. And that was that.

For Harold Strand and myself this is the end of a search that started about 30 years ago. Now is the time to give credit to a DEADEYE who noticed an article in his local newspaper, The Berwyn Life, and recalled our item in the Dispatch. Except for Rudolph

Private Who Chiseled Generals, Continued

Kurt was born in what is now called East Germany on April 12, 1899, and learned to carve when he was six or seven years old. Practically born with a chisel in his hand, he excelled in the art of wood carving. He carved dolls for his sister and toys for himself, yet wood carving did not become his profession. It remained just a pastime as did leather and copper embossing, etching, engraving and wooden jewelry.

He came to America in 1927. Later, within a span of 20 years, beginning in 1948, he was employed as an inhalation therapist at the Presbyterian, Michael Reese, Edgewater, McNeal and St. Francis Hospitals in the Chicago area. Out of generosity, during his spare moments he would carve profile and emblem plaques for organizations without remuneration. To mention a few of his carvings - emblem plaques for the National and Illinois Association of Inhalation Therapists, a profile carving of Florence Nightengale

for the nurses' quarters at the old Presbyterian Hospital, an emblem plaque for the Czechoslovakian Society, an emblem plaque for the National Blinded Veterans Association, and finally, his masterpiece for John Malamazian, a man whom the blinded veterans claim as their own.

Besides being visually impaired, Ku suffers from emphysema. Several times day he gives himself pulmo-sonic nebul therapy. It took him almost a whole ye to carve the Malamazian plaque - which would have required only a week with a good pair of eyes. Nevertheless, he persevered and with his skill produced another fine piece of art.

When asked why he made a plaque for Malamazian, Litzkuhn replied, "In gratitude to Mr. Malamazian himself, becauhe is a great man and has helped so man many blind people. Also, my work would serve as encouragement to others who have the same visual problems as I have





The 96th Infantry Division Association has a block of 400 rooms for the reunion.


