

TREASURER'S REPORT

As my third year as Treasurer of our Association is rapidly nearing completition, I wish to extend my thanks and gratitude to the many that have made my task rewarding. 





Houston ranks high in the nation in academic achievement and is the home of more than 25 colleges and universities.
