Description of the Tours

Saturday July 27, 1996 - Farmers Market and Tour of Des Moines

Take your pick of fresh produce, pastries and crafts at the Downtown Farmers Market on Court Avenue. It's been called one of the best farmers markets in the U.S. by Bon Appetit Magazine. Afterwards, (the Market closes at 11:00 a.m.) enjoy a lunch of your own on Court Avenue. The restaurants nestled in this renovated 19th Century warehouse district will tantalize any tastebuds. Reboard the bus for a narrated tour of the Des Moines Metropolitan Area. Major points of interest will include the Iowa State Capitol Building, the largest state capital in the nation (known for it's 23 karat gold dome) and Camp Dodge which features the Iowa Gold Star Museum and the new Stark Armory. You will also see the three historical mansions of the area, one of which is now the residence of the Governor of Iowa Governor of Iowa.

Saturday July 27, 1996 - Prairie Meadows

Upon arrival, enjoy a buffet dinner in the Picnic Pavillion, a private facility fot the 96th Infantry Division, which overlooks the tracks. Enjoy Thoroughbred and/or Quarter Horse racing. The first race is currently scheduled for 7:00 p.m. For your convenience there are betting windows in the Pavilion. After dinner, make your fortune playing slots! Over 1100 slot machines to choose from, filling two floors of the Midwest's most beautiful new casino. You have your choice of nickel, quarter, dollar, five-dollar and twenty-five dollar closely regulated slot machines that are set for high returns. BUSES WILL RETURN THROUGHOUT THE EVENING AS THEY FILL.

Sunday July 28, 1996 - Living History Farms

This 600 acre open air museum tells the amazing story of how Iowans combined hard work and advances in technology to transform the fertile prairies of the Midwest into the most productive farmland in the world. Visitors travel at their own pace through five historical time periods spanning 300 years.

Monday July 29, 1996 - Bridges of Madison County

The most romantic country in the world. It has been famous for it's covered bridges and John Wayne Birthplace. In recent years it's been catapulted to worldwide fame by the popularity of Robert James Waller's novel "The Bridges of Madison County" and the filming of the movie version in the summer of 1994. While in Madison County you have the opportunity to visit Francescas' house (time permitting) where the majority of the movie was filmed. The aura of Robert and Francesca still lingers as you walk through the farmhouse propped as it was for the movie. Next visit two covered bridges as your guide creates a bridge between vesterday and today bridge between yesterday and today.

Tuesday July 30, 1996 - Valley Junction In 1893 Valley Junction bustles with horse drawn traffic, a trolley line, eight-foot-wide sidewalks, and dirt street lined with tree banks, three drug stores and several boarding house. By the turn of the century, the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad made Valley Junction a popular stop where 36 passenger trains arrived and departed daily. A century later, the charming past is thriving in Valley Junction. There are more than 120 specialty stores, art galleries, fashion boutiques rectaurants and antique shops boutiques, restaurants and antique shops.

HOTEL LOCATION

The Des Moines Marriott, located at 700 Grand Avenue, sits in the heart of the business and financial district of downtown Des Moines. The hotel is just off Interstate 235 at the 7th Avenue or downtown exit. Via skywalks, the hotel is connected to the Ruan Center, Veterans Auditorium, and Des Moines Convention Center, as well as shops and restaurants. Des Moines International Airport is only 10-12 minutes away. Directions to the hotel: From the airport - head north on Fleur Drive to Locust Street. Make a right turn and continue east to 6th Avenue. Turn left onto 6th Avenue continuing one block to Grand Avenue. Turn left onto Grand Avenue and again continue one block. Hotel is on the corner of 7th and Grand. From I-235 eastbound - Exit onto 7th Street. Make a right turn on 7th Street to Grand Avenue. Hotel is at 7th and Grand, entrance on Grand.

From I-235 westbound - Take the 3rd Street Exit. Stay on exit ramp until 7th Street. Make a left turn onto 7th Street and continue to Grand Avenue. The hotel is at the corner of Grand and 7th, entrance on Grand.

NOT EXACTLY A LOVE-IN IN LUBBOCK

At the reunion in Lubbock, DEADEYES played host to a four-man team straight from Japan's Tokyo Broadcasting System (TBS). Those Oriental guests roamed in the background with their video camera and lights. They covered the meetings, the memorial service and the Saturday night function - everything from start to finish - all the while mixing in interviews.

A spokesman for the TV people said their mission was to film a documentary for airing back home. And their focus centered on current feelings and emotions as expressed by veterans of the 96th Infantry Division toward their adversary in World War Two. Had the old warriors mellowed through the years?

Consider the fact that a half-century ago, to Americans the Japanese had been tenacious and vicious enemies. And where the men of the 96th were concerned especially, one and all of them were shameless villains from the Japanese point of view. Suppose such sentiments persisted to this day.

Imagine big bold headlines on the newspapers for Thursday, July 27, 1995, that might have screamed "Japanese Inside 96th Perimeter in Lubbock." Certainly the infiltrators would have been routed.

Times change. This time peace was not disturbed. What happened was not exactly a love-in with the outsiders from abroad; they were mostly ignored. No doubt about it, though, there were overheard scattered unhappy mutterings - taken to indicate a preference for the Japanese to be somewhere else.

DEADEYES and their families socialized and handled business as usual.



ALBERT H. BALES (F-383) died June 3, 1945, the day after he was wounded. At that time his company was stuck in the mud about two miles north of the Yuza-Dake Escarpment. In spite of everything, Albert had been writing daily letters to Delma. When the letters stopped, she knew something had happened. Her inquiry to the company commander was answered before the War Department got around to confirming by mail. After the fighting was over, Albert's foxhole buddy, Orrie Gruwell, now living in Mountain Ranch, California, filled in

the details.



MR. KO YOSHIOKA, anchorman for TBS, chose to interview MRS. DELMA (BALES) SCOTT and daughter MRS. JOLETA EDIN-BURGH in the History Room at the Lubbock Civic Center on Saturday night. He followed a format similar to the one used with the Ohms the day before, but expanded to include Joleta's comments. Mr. Yoshioka's manner was quiet, totally without expression and unhurried while his questions were filtered through the interpreter then waiting for the answers to be translated back to him. Meantime, he appeared to study the interviewee intently and encourage them to ramble.

GUY A. GOEN (M-381) was killed on April 17, 1945, in the shadow of Kakazu Ridge. In June 1995, the Ohms accompanied the Valor Tours group to Okinawa. There, with the help of a military guide who was familiar with the terrain, they located the position where Guy's unit had been dug in.

JERRY OHM, the sister of Guy Goen, and her husband KARL hooked up with the DEADEYE reunion in Sparks, Nevada, in 1993 and again the following year in Hot Springs, Arkansas. At the 1995 reunion in Lubbock, when the Japanese asked Jerry to tell her story for the video, she responded, "I'll be happy to talk about my brother."



JERRY'S INTERVIEW

Jerry and Karl Ohm, 4760 Pleasant Hill Road, Richfield, Wisconsin 53076, did not quite know what to expect when they were escorted by the Japanese TV people to a completely empty field on the outskirts of Lubbock. At the site the anchorman finally decided on a suitable camera angle to avoid shadows. Then, with only the sweltering Texas sky for a backdrop, he asked Jerry how it was growing up with Guy.

Jerry recalled the good times when she enjoyed being a kid sister - a raft of memories that will stick with her always. "There were just the two of us. Guy would put up with a lot of stuff from me. He was a very loving brother. Like when he delivered papers on his bike, he would let me ride along on the back."

The interviewer wanted to know her reaction when Guy was drafted. "Well, being a teenager, I just didn't take it very seriously at first. He will be back in a little while," she said.

Did your brother mind being drafted? Did he want to go to war? Jerry's answer caused the anchorman to change the subject. "He had to because of Pearl Harbor."

Next came a series of questions having to do with the news that Guy had been killed. "I was very bitter and had a hatred," she said, "but now that I am older I understand that the servicemen of both countries believed that they were defending their country...."

And the followup to that exchange was do you still hate the Japanese? Answer: "'No.'

'They were just anxious for me to say 'no.'" What did your brother want to become if he had lived? "I suppose he may have become a horticulturist. He loved nature."

Notes: The Ohms had had experience with the Japanese media during their earlier visit to Okinawa. It was their impression that these people still do not understand why the Americans tried so hard to destroy Japan.

On Saturday night when Jerry and Karl were leaving the Civic Center, they met Mr. Yoshioka at the door. He asked in plain English, "Are you going to the dance?" The startled Karl replied, "We hope to see you in Tokyo."

DELMA'S INTERVIEW

"Albert came AWOL for Joleta's first birthday on January 26, 1945, the only one he ever got to share and also her first Christmas," said Mrs. Delma (Bales) Scott, 2003 Malivar, Clyde, Texas 79510, as she relived the awfulness of having to deal with the death of her husband. And amongst the tears of despair was the dread for a future that included the prospect of rearing a daughter alone. "It seemed as if my world had collapsed."

"When I think of the things Albert and I talked about, perhaps he had a premonition of death," Delma said. "If he didn't return he wanted Joleta to grow up knowing his family as well as mine. He expected me to discipline her because he felt he had been brought up in a very permissive way, having been an only boy."

"He wanted me to work at something where I wouldn't be competing with men - that is why I later chose the Extension Service," she said.

Delma told about first returning to her parents home in Baird, Texas, and finishing out a term teaching Science and Math at the local school. "After that I went to graduate school at Texas Tech University to qualify as a Home Demonstration Agent. My first job with the Extension Service began August 1, 1946 in Fisher County, Texas. It was very difficult for me to work with young couples and their children - to see them bend down and pick up their children. I felt the war had cheated me of that privilege."

Delma said Albert's remains were brought to Fort Sam Houston Military Cemetery. His grave is only a stone's throw across the fence from where he left.

In 1947, Delma married Jearl Scott and moved to a cotton farm near Lubbock. A son, Bobby Wayne, was born in 1957. He turned out to be an Ag Teacher at Panhandle State University, Goodwill, Oklahoma, and a college rodeo coach.

Joleta married a mechanical engineer. She is a Crisis Councilor for a co-op of several schools around Crosbyton, Texas, also she has a private practice for family and marriage counciling.

Jearl Scott died in 1987.

I just noted that my membership in the Division Association expired in July, so I have enclosed my check to cover two years membership. I have added extra to help cover postage. I enjoy reading the Deadeye Dispatch, particularly "Mail Call." Though I did not serve in the Division during WW II, my service in the Division was limited to the time I served in Enlisted Reserve Corps as a Sergeant and assigned to the Division from September 24, 1940, until I was ordered to Active Duty in August 1941.

As you may know, the Division was organized in 1923 as an "on paper" Division for the Pacific Northwest Reserves. Many Reserve Officers and Enlisted Reserve Corps Men from the NW were assigned to the Division. Some of the Officers were given two weeks of Active Duty for training during the 1920's and 1930's, but Enlised Men were not given any training periods, issued no uniforms, received no pay, attended no drills, had no idea who their commanding officer was, promotions were rare if any and instructed to inform the Military Area Hqs of any change of address.

The ERC members were issued a warrant indicating their grade, when they enlisted. Most of the ERC members came from the Citizens Military Training Camps. If you attended camps for four summers, you could enlist in the ERC as a Sergeant for three years. You could sign up for the 10-series Correspondence Studies and when you completed these, you could take a physical exam and appear before a Board of Regular Army Officers and if you passed, you were commissioned a 2nd Lt. in the Reserve. This was an easy way of obtaining a commission, other than West Point and college ROTC. In 1940, there were only 3,233 ERC members in the Army Reserve Nation wide. There were only 21 ERC members from the Northwest, ordered to active duty and I was one of them.

I was shipped overseas in February 1942 and ended up here in Australia. I was in a cadre of 32 enlisted men sent over for assignment to Gen. MacArthur's Hqs. in Melbourne, when he arrived from the Philippines. He only brought his Chiefs of Staff out with him, so we were the initial enlisted staff. I was promoted to Warrant Officer in 1943 and assigned to another unit in New Guinea. After serving in Australia, New Guinea and the Philippines, I finally got back home in March 1946, after four years out here in the Pacific.

I was out of the Army for two years, but had gone back into the Oregon National Guard as a Warrant Officer and was commissioned and ordered back to Active Duty in 1948 and stayed in until I retired as a Major in 1963.

I had married a Brisbane gal in 1943, so we came down here with our kids in 1964 for a two year visit and just stayed on. My wife and I have had fourteen trips back to the States in the past 31 years, so we have not lost track of our friends and relatives back in Oregon. I have a ham radio station, so chat with my old ham friend back in Oregon and they keep me up on the news from back home.




ATTENTION ALL DEADEYES -- A Message from Armed Forces Reunions, Inc.
