#### MEET ME IN ST. LOUIS!

Forty years ago Minor Butler had a Dream. Today it is a Reality.

The first meeting of the 96th Infantry Division Association was held at the Statler Hilton Hotel, 9th & St. Charles St. in St. Louis in 1958. Minor Butler paid for the advance news of the meeting himself. He hoped donations would take care of the expenses. Approximately 103 Deadeyes attended the first reunion and decided to meet the following year in Chicago, Il. Minor was elected President.

Now forty years later the Association has a budget and about 6000 members on the mailing list. We are again meeting in St. Louis at Henry VIII Hotel and Conference Center, July 24, 25 and 26, 1997. Let's make this the biggest reunion yet.

There is much to see in St. Louis. We can visit the Nation's tallest monument -- The Gateway Arch at 630 feet high. St. Louis is the home of the famous Budweiser Clydesdales at the Anheuser-Buch Brewery. The Cathedral of St. Louis has one of the largest mosaic art collections in the world. This is only three of the many attractions to see in St. Louis.

MetroLink, St. Louis' light rail system, makes it easy to explore some of the most popular attractions.

Henry VIII is conveniently located on Lindbergh (U.S. 67), onehalf mile north of I-70, and one mile South of I-270.

You can reach St. Louis by car, AmTrack, Greyhound Bus Line and by plane. The following Airlines are: Air Canada, American, American West, Continental, Delta, Northwest, Southwest, TWA, U.S. Air and United.

Don't forget! The place is the Henry VIII Hotel and Conference Center, St. Louis, Mo. The Date is July 24, 25, 26, 1997.

#### CITY TOUR

- 10:00 Board bus for a guided tour of St. Louis. Take in Laclede's Landing, a revitalized 19th century warehouse district with cobblestone streets and cast iron street lamps. Drive through the Soulard area and make a short stop at the market for fresh fruits and other produce.
- 11:30 Lunch on your own and free time at Union Station. First opened in 1894, this restored National Historic Landmark is now a festive marketplace with numerous restaurants, eateries, and specialty shops.
- 1:15 Reboard bus and continue the city tour with a stop at the New Cathedral to see one of the largest collections of mosaic art in the Western Hemisphere. Also take in Forest Park where the St. Louis Zoo and several museums are located.
- 3:30 Back at the hotel.
- Note: Due to the size of the group, we are unable to schedule a tour of the Anheuser-Busch Brewery. Please make these arrangements on your own by inquiring at the Henry VIII front desk. \$17/Person includes bus and guide. Lunch is not included.

#### FRIDAY, JULY 25 GRANTS FARM

- 1:15 Board bus for Grant's Farm.
- 2:00 Arrive at Grant's Farm. This 281-acre ancestral home of the Busch Family, is named after Ulysses S. Grant, Civil War Commander and the 18th President of the United States, who once lived on and farmed part of these grounds. Your adventure begins at Grant Station, where you will board a trackless train for a tour of the beautiful grounds. Your first stop is the Bauernhof courtyard where you can enjoy refreshments, or continue on to the Tier Garten for a close-up look at a fascinating variety of animals. Some exhibits allow you to pet and feed these animals! There are also regularly scheduled elephant and bird shows available. Afterwards, reboard the train for a scenic tour of the Deer Park. This 160-acre game preserve is home to thirty different exotic species, including bison, elk and antelope. Next pass Grant's Cabin, the log home built by Ulysses S. Grant in 1856. At the close of your adventure, you are invited to see the World-Famous Budweiser Clydesdale horses.
- 5:15 Reboard bus to return to the hotel by 6pm.

- 12:30 Board bus for St. Charles. You might consider tours of the Old Capitol buildings (Missouri's first), dating back to 1821 (small admission fee required). Enjoy lunch and time to shop on your own.

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# DO YOU WISH TO CONTINUE RECEIVING THE DEADEYE DISPATCH? IF SO, PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION .....





# JEEP-

When the Army and the Go Devil Engine Got Together An inexpensive fast reconnaissance vehicle had been the US Army's dream for 30 years. What the Army wanted was a vehicle to replace the horse and the motorcycle, to carry cargo and people. The Army tested Ford, Chevrolet and Bantam road cars and those from other manufacturers as well, but none could fill the bill.

When the world found itself once again on the brink of another major war, the need for a light reconnaissance vehicle became urgent. As

late as June 27, 1940, after the German mechanized divisions had chased 340,000 British and French troops into the ocean at Dunkirk, the US Army's Quartermaster Corps Ordinance Technical Committee released specifications for a new military vehicle:

- 1) Four-wheel drive
- 2) Minimum speed 3mph
- 3) Empty weight 13001b\*
- 4) Payload 6001b
- 5) Wheelbase 80in
- 6) Height 36in
- 7) Track 47in
- 8) Ground clearance 6.5in
- \* Empty weight later revised to 24231b

Of the 135 companies that were asked to submit plans by July 22 and followup with 70 finished examples within 75 days, only two companies bothered to reply. Bantam, a company on the ropes financially, was one of those. After 48 days of 18-hour shifts, the engineering team at Bantam's Butler, Pennsylvania factory posed for this group photo. Harold Crist is seated in the driver's seat; Karl Probst is leaning on the spare wheel. Without the help of this hard working and creative group, Bantam would never have been able to design, get approved or build the first 'Jeep' in such a short time. Today, Detroit takes longer to design prototype door handles for its new cars than this complete vehicle took to produce.

Karl Probst, consulting engineer to the Bantam Car Co. of Butler, Pennsylvania, started with the chasis from a Bantam roadster. He scrounged parts - a Continental four-cylinder engine, Warner gearbox, Spicer transfer case to the front wheels, axles from a Studebaker Champion car and some sheet metal from a salvage yard. Then he and Harold Crist, the plant manager, drove the finished vehicle 200 miles to Camp Holabird for testing by the Army. They met the deadline by minutes.

After the Jeep was driven until it broke, the Army was impressd.

Bantam received a contract for 70 more Jeeps which were delivered in time to take part in the first mechanized maneuvers of the Army the following spring.

Ford and Willys finagled copies of Bantam's blueprints during the testing at Camp Holabird.

This is a typically restored Jeep.... The Willys MB design was accepted as standard by the Army in November 1941 then both Willys and Ford were awarded contracts. Nearly 649,000 Jeeps were turned out in the next five years with Willys completing a new Jeep every 80 seconds at the peak of its production. By the end of World War II the US Army calculated that it had ten years' supply of new and used Jeeps stockpiled all over the country. JEEP - When the Army and the Go-Devil Engine Got Together

Months later Ford developed a prototype utilizing its Ferguson Dearborn tractor engine and Model A transmission, a combination with too many problems to fix.

Willys had a powerful, rugged and reliable four-cylinder engine called the Go-Devil that had been used in its 1938 Whippet. The Go-Devil engine finally persuaded the Army to favor Willys with a first contract to supply 16,000 Jeeps each unit costing \$739.

Bantam built only 2675 of its version of the Jeep. After losing out to Willys, Bantam finished out the war years making trailers and aircraft landing gear.

The war emergency caused Willys to agree to share its patents and specifications, including the Go-Devil engine, with Ford. That was why the bulk of the DEADEYES would never know an Army without Jeeps.







#### OKINAWA "D" PLUS 13

As an Infantry Replacement I spent several weeks in a tent city on the island of Saipan. Finally we were loaded aboard another ship and again, we didn't know our destination. The sea was calm, the days were warm, the bow waves sent the flying fish racing alongside us. We stalled in a group of islands with nothing much to do except unload some garbage into a small boat.

We set sail again and reached land altho we were not told where we were. We climbed down the side of the ship on a cargo net and into a boat which took us ashore. It was April 13, 1945. "D" plus 13 on Okinawa.

WE WERE TO DIG IN ON AN AIRFIELD. WE DUG OUR SLIT TRENCHES AND PUT UP OUR TWO MAN PUP TENTS. WE FOUND THAT THE THREE VARIETIES OF CANNED C RATIONS HAD BEEN CHANGED TO MORE PALATABLE MENUS AND THAT THE TROOPS AHEAD OF US HAD ALREADY THROWN AWAY SOME THAT WE HAD NEVER TASTED.

AFTER GETTING SET FOR THE NIGHT WE SLITHERED INTO OUR TWO MAN PUP TENT WHICH HAD THE ENTRANCE OPEN BUT WE HAD A THING CALLED A MOSQUITO BAR, A THING LIKE A FLEXIBLE SCREEN THAT COULD BE HUNG OVER THE ENTRANCE TO KEEP THE BUGS OUT.

I had just dozed off, cuddled up to my M-1 rifle when I heard a whooshing sound, then a thud. My training told me that this was an dud artillery round. I thought that this would be a good time to head for my slit trench. I started crawling out of the tent and forgot about the mosquito bar which I got tangled up in and couldn't find my way out of. Finally I just stood up and got rid of it and dived into my slit trench as the second round landed sounding like when two boxcars clang together. I could hear the shell fragments sail through the air like a whirling saw blade.

Several more landed that night, we lost 3 airplanes. In the morning the "Wise guys" who thought they didn't need a slit trench, were digging furiously. By the time they had them completed, we got orders to "Move out."


