

HOTEL LOCATION

The Drawbridge Estate, at I-75 and Buttermilk Pike, is just five miles northeast of the Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport. The hotel is also five miles south of downtown Cincinnati and Covington's Riverfront.

Greater Cincinnati is one of the nation's most accessible areas, whether your travel is by auto or air. Greater Cincinnati is within five hundred miles of more than half of the U.S. population. Major interstates into Greater Cincinnati are I-75, I-71, I-74, and I-275 loop. Explicit directions from these major arteries are available from the hotel's guest services department.

HOTEL EXTRAS

The Estate comprises some 23 acres of lodging, dining and recreational facilities including the Oldenberg Brewery and Entertainment Complex. The Inn presently offers 500 fully equipped rooms. The main section of the Inn consists of 375 rooms which offer a residential look and amenities which create comfort and a feeling of home. Coffee makers are provided in guest rooms in the Inn. One hundred rooms are located within a detached building called the Garison, located 100 yards from the Main building. All general hotel facilities and services are available to Garison guests; however, the Garison features it's own outdoor pool and snack shop.

The hotel offers free parking, one heated indoor pool, two seasonal outdoor pools, two outdoor lighted tennis courts, sand volleyball and basketball courts, shuffleboard, horseshoes, an exercise-challenge jogging course, whirlpool, wet/dry sauna and select exercise equipment. Check in is at 3pm; check out at 12 noon.

Hotel dining includes:

-Chaucer's, a 24 hour coffee shop.

-The Crossbow, the area's liveliest nightspot; open Mon-Sat until 2am.

-The Gatehouse Taverne, serves dinner in an Old English "Castle" setting. Hours are Mon-Thurs 5:30-10pm; Fri-Sat 5:30-10:30pm; Sun 4:30-9:00pm.

-Josh's, serving a wide selection of continental cuisine for lunch Mon-Fri. 11:30am-2:30pm; serves dinner Wed-Sat; and brunch on Sunday 10am-1pm.

-Room service is available 6:30am-11pm.

Located nearby:

The Oldenberg Brewery Complex, located next to the hotel, includes the American Museum of Brewing History and Arts and the Oldenberg Brewery. You can enjoy a tour and/or tasting at one of America's premier micro-breweries. Burbank's Restaurant, featuring BBQ Ribs, serves lunch and dinner 11am-11pm Sun-Thurs or 11am-12pm on Fri-Sat. Coyotes, the areas largest Country/Western Music and Dance hall, is open Wed-Sun 7pm-2am.

AIRPORT SHUTTLE

Complimentary shuttle service is provided to and from the Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport. The shuttle runs 24 hours a day seven days a week or upon request. No shuttle service is available 2-6am Sunday. Simply pick up the courtesy phone located in each baggage claim terminal and the "Coach to the Castle" is on the way to pick you up.

NEARBY RV PARK

The hotel has six RV parking spaces with electrical hookup only currently for \$15 plus tax per night. Please call the hotel reservations department to secure your space. The nearest park with full hook-up is the Florence RV Park, located 16 miles south of Cincinnati. Please call (606) 371-8352 for more information.

WHEELCHAIRS


INSCRIPTION ON MONUMENT

Organized on September 5, 1918, (World War I). Demobilized January 7, 1919. Became Oregon's Reserve Division in 1923. Activate to active duty August 15, 1942, at Camp Adair with orders to be Combat Ready as soon as possible. Trained at Camp Adair, Fort Lewis, San Luis Obispo, and Bend desert. Left United States July 25, 1944, for Hawaii. Landed on Leyte on October 20, 1944, as one of the first Combat Units to invade the Philippines. 603 killed, 1,401 injured. Landed on Okinawa on April 1, 1945. 1,598 killed, 5,614 injured. Returned to Philippines July 1945 for training on invasion of Japan. Returned to United States in March, 1946.


"This Memorial is dedicated to those killed in action, to those wounded in combat and to all those gallant men who served as Deadeves."

The above inscription will be on a 96th Division memorial marker to be dedicated by the Northwest Chapter on June 6, 1998. at Camp Adair. Oregon. This marker will finalize erection of all divisions, 70th Infantry. 91st Infantry, and 104th Infantry that trained at Camp Adair. The park, located in the midst of a Wild Life Refuge, is located in the middle of the camp area, just off State Highway 99W north of Corvallis, Or. The annual business meeting of Northwest Chapter will be on Sunday, June 7, 1998.

Her Active Duty Military Career Began at Camp Adair

Helen Gribble figured she knew what she was getting into when she enlisted in the Army at Fort Douglas, Utah, in November 1942. During nurse's training at St. Mark's Hospital in Salt Lake City one of her supervisors who had been an Army nurse in World War I tried to convince the whole class to join up. Not many were persuaded.

With nurse's training out of the way and on top of that a post grad course in pediatrics at the Cook County Hospital in Chicago, Helen returned to work as a supervisor at St. Mark's.

The girl from Hagerman, Idaho, with the initials ANC (Army Nurse Corps) appended to her name for the duration of World War II did not enlist in a grand patriotic gesture, nor did she carry on like a female activist with an agenda. In fact, she was p.o.'d at a boyfriend. Too many times he had been gone for too long on hunting and fishing jaunts. This particular big game hunt was planned to last one whole month!

When the boyfriend came home, Helen was gone. The Army had her.

As promised, the first stop was at Letterman General Hospital in San Francisco for a short period of orientation, but what came later was a downer. According to the word from the head nurse there would likely be hard times ahead for the group.

Helen was unhappy when she heard the news.
"It had been decided that we needed to go to
Camp Adair, Oregon. A big new camp was being
opened and they didn't have any amenities or anything - that didn't appeal to me." She began having second thoughts....

The reality of Army life was not all that it was 'cracked up to be.' Without a doubt she had gotten into a hell of a mess. Helen made up her mind to eat crow or whatever.

"I wrote to the boyfriend that I had dumped and told him that I would marry him. He sent me back a clipping that said the only way out of the Army for a nurse was to get pregnant. Of course it wasn't that way when I went in, but he thought it was. Besides, he wasn't too much for kids. As far as he was concerned, I could just stew in my own brew."

Literally dangling at the end of her rope, Helen abandoned all efforts to escape and went off to Camp Adair with about a dozen other nurses.

More nurses arrived daily during the winter months of '43. Everything was happening so fast because trainload after trainload of draftees who would be turned into DEADEYES were filling up the camp. Living conditions were fairly rustic even in the nurse's quarters at the hospital.

Helen remembered, "My room had an iron bed with a mattress and sheets, a blanket and a pillow, but no curtains and no dresser. I made curtains from material that I bought in town and we put orange crates together to make dressers. My closet was a great big cardboard box that stood on one end. Naturally the longer we were there the more comfortable things became.

"We went to work in shifts as nurses. There was no actual roll call, though we had to go out and do exercises. They made us take walks - hikes up and down the hills."

Since the Army did not commission nurses to begin with, they were considered as being comparable to 2d lieutenants - part of the Army, but in some ways not yet in the Army. Their dress uniform was a Navy blue blouse with a lighter blue skirt. All of that changed eventually to olive drab and the nurse's uniforms were patterned after the men's, including the hat.

The beehive that was Camp Adair allowed few diversions. Sometimes even a visit to the PX could be more or less exciting. One evening Chaplain O'Keefe offered Helen and her companions a ride in his Jeep over to the 382d Officer's Club. That became the starting place for the whirlwind romance between Lt. Helen Gribble, ANC, and Lt. Cledith Bourdeau, AUS.

During the next few months before the 96th moved to Fort Lewis, Washington, in May '43, Cledith kept his dates with Helen by walking to and from the 382d area to the other end of the camp where the hospital was situated. And those nighttime miles did add up for him and a fellow officer who always came along for company. The new man in Helen's life had a day job that used up a lot of time, yet a telephone call and a letter followed whenever he got back to his place. Wasn't that romantic?

Helen was busy, too. "The first day I went on duty, I was assigned to a ward that was full of meningitis. Men were terribly sick with stiff necks and backs and headaches. In the more advanced cases the victim's head would be bending backwards toward his knees. Try to imagine that.

LT. HELEN GRIBBLE AND LT. CLEDITH Bourdeau became engaged in the spring of 1943, then romance was put on hold until the war ended. In those early days, Army nurses did not have their own uniforms.

LT. GRIBBLE'S OVERSEAS DUTY ASSIGNMENT was to New Caledonia, a center to which the sick and wounded men were being evacuated from the fighting on islands across the Pacific Ocean.

AT THE 31ST STATION HOSPITAL IN New Caledonia in 1943, Lt. Helen Gribble shared living quarters with three other nurses.

"Maybe the people who set up the hospital could never have expected such an outbreak, so they had no good technique at all. And the GIs who were taking care of the meningitis patients didn't know anything about what they were dealing with.

"I asked the assistant head nurse to let me teach those boys about contageous diseases. They had to quit taking their smoke breaks with the workers from other parts of the hospital. There would be no more open wards with just a sheet barrier between the beds. The meningitis cases were isolated into their own private rooms and given their own caretakers."

The cause of the outbreak was never discovered, though its swift spread certainly had something to do with the close confinement of persons. There were 45 cases of meningitis in Camp Adair, but only one death. Everybody in the Division from top to bottom had to take a sulfa tablet. No physical activity was permitted while this was going on, so training was called off for a day or two. The main aftereffect of the drug was a bad hangover. After the alarm had subsided the 9th Service Command sent investigators to study the problem and the way it was handled.

In the midst of all that, Helen and Cledith

found time to become engaged.

The month of May '43 was moving time. Helen's medical team shipped out for New Caledonia, a French territory in the Southwest Pacific. Cledith's outfit trucked north to Oregon for further training and more than another year stateside before heading out for its fateful campaigns on Leyte and Okinawa.

Thank Heaven for V-Mail. Thank Heaven for V-J Day. Fast forward to December 1945.

Lt. Helen Gribble, ANC, was putting in her time supervising a cancer ward at Letterman General. When the ship with Cledith aboard docked in Los Angeles Harbor, there was Helen to meet it - practically in her wedding gown. Captain Bourdeau's terminal leave started just before Christmas, but the wartime travel restrictions kept him from leaving California during the holidays.

What Helen really wanted was a full military wedding at Letterman. All of the arrangements had been made for weeks. Also, the chaplain had asked General 'Vinegar Joe' Stilwell to decorate Cledith with his Distinguished Service Cross at the same time (refer to The DEADEVES p. 52).

A rather low-key wedding did happen December 29, 1945, in Coalinga, California, Cledith's hometown. The Bourdeaus have lived there ever since. They raised five kids.




WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL

The World War II Memorial will be located on the Mall in Washington, D.C., directly between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial.







The Combat Infantry Badge:




