Deadeyes Answer the Call to Duty

"Since the terrorist attacks of

September 11th, US Army soldiers

have participated in a determined and

relentless campaign to defeat enemies

who challenge our way of life."



"Deadeyes", both past and present, are part of an honored tradition of soldiers that have answered the Call to Duty. The Call to Duty springs from the Nobility of Service—the Warrior Ethos and Army Values that have been handed down to us throughout the history of this great nation. It is the legacy of those who have gone before-the many thousands of soldiers who have answered the call from the earliest days of the Revolution, on through all the dark times when freedom has been lost to oppression, when people have cried out for rescue from tyranny. The Call to Duty binds us to our service and guides the course of action we take as guardians, as defenders of freedom, for this great country of ours.

In the terrible winter of 1776, enlistments in the Revolutionary Army were ending and the fate of a fledgling nation appeared uncertain. Urging sol-

diers to continue to fight for freedom, Thomas Paine wrote his own moving call to duty: "These are the times that try men's souls. The summer

soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands by it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman." The Welcome Home Warrior-Citizen ceremony was created to demonstrate the thanks we have for those that did not shrink in this time of crisis. It was developed to honor, in a small measure, soldiers who have willingly answered their nation's call to war.

The 96th Regional Readiness Command has its own unique history of soldiers that have willingly answered the Call, of which you are a part. Over the years, thousands of soldiers from the 96th have been deployed to fight in various campaigns. During the Okinawa campaign, a technical sergeant displayed conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the Call of Duty. When a powerfully conducted predawn Japanese counterattack struck Sergeant Beauford T. Anderson's unit's flank, he ordered his men to take cover in an old tomb, and then, armed only with a carbine, faced the onslaught alone. After emptying one magazine at pointblank range into the screaming attacker, he seized an enemy mortar dud and threw it back among the charging Japanese, killing several as it burst. Securing a box of mortar shells, he extracted the safety pins, banged the bases upon a rock to arm them and proceeded alternately to hurl shells and fire his piece among the fanatical foe, finally forcing them to withdraw. Despite the protests of his comrades, and bleeding profusely from a severe shrapnel wound, he made his way to his company commander to report the action. Technical Sergeant Anderson's intrepid conduct in the face of overwhelming odds accounted for 25 enemy killed and several machineguns and knee mortars destroyed, thus single-handedly removing a serious threat to a company's flank.

Now in 2006, we are an army at war for a nation at war. Since the terrorist attacks of September 11th, US Army soldiers have participated in a determined and relentless campaign to

defeat enemies who challenge our way of life. This is a new reality that soldiers understand all too well: since 9/11, American soldiers have wit-

nessed more than a battalion's worth of their comrades killed in action, more than a brigade's worth severely wounded. Their sacrifices in the Global War on Terror have liberated more than 46 million people, but this is not all. The Army Reserve plays a unique role in this campaign; we are citizen soldiers, and as such, we do not just do our military jobs, but we donate our time and energy to the civilian community as well.

I agree with Thomas Paine that every man and woman who risks their life for freedom, for something greater than oneself, is a hero. And I am so proud that I am a part of the ranks of men and women who created a country during the Revolution, who freed a people from slavery during the Civil War, and liberated a continent during World War II. Our uniforms, equipment, and even our faces have changed over 230 years, but I took the same oath as men and women who have gladly sacrificed their own lives to protect freedom and their fellow soldiers. I answered the same call of duty to place my mission first and to serve with honor. I am still moved by the soldiers who have come before, and the soldiers I have the privilege of serving with every day. Deadeye Ready!

The 96TH Infantry Division reunion Association has almost fifty years of keeping the traditions of this Infantry Division alive, as well as maintaining an annual reunion to enjoy old and make new friend-

ships. We have met every year at different 1 o c a t i o n s around the c o u n t r y. Volunteers kept the records and did the organ-

izational work. We had several thousand WWII veterans from the division on our mailing list.

In recent years, we developed a kinship with the successor organizations of the old Infantry Division which was deactivated. Various names were assigned by the Army to the Reserve Units and we now have a close relationship with the 96th Div. RRC.

The old guard of the reunion association has been phasing out that corporation in the past couple of years. We had our last official reunion in 2005 in the D.C. area and it was a huge success. Many of our RRC friends were in attendance.

We have formed a new corporate entity to help to perpetuate the legacy of the old Infantry Division and its WWII battles on Okinawa and Leyte. In addition, our mission statement is changing as we want to perpetuate the legacies of the many Reservists who have and are performing valiantly in the hot spots of the world today. One more responsibility is being added into our "raison d'etre," that of providing succor to the families of the active duty military in our midst.

The new corporate By-Laws provide for the inclusion of many factions in our eligibility list. First, all of the life members of the old organization and its auxiliary are automatically life members in the new organization. Family members of the original group are starting to join and to participate. Next, all members of the RRC and its predecessor organizations are invited to join. All family members of the RRC military are invited to come with us.

Finally, any member of the public may join.

A dues schedule has been adopted as recommended by Gen. Jim Collins and his membership committee and will be published soon. An annual meeting of the new organization will be held during the last full week of July in Denver, Co. Elections will be held for both

Directors and Officers.

Efforts are being made to have our new organization organized under Utah laws to be non-profit and exempt from IRS

involvement. To a c c o m p l i s h some of the PR things we would like to do will take cash and we would like to make it possible for contributions to

be tax-deductible to the donors. We should know the outcome of our efforts soon.

So, the new Deadeye Association is up and running and we invite one and all to join with us in our quest for legacy perpetuation and military family assistance.

In addition to old-timers from the reunion association, the impetus and leadership for transforming into this wider membership-based organization was in a large part due to the promotional skills of Gen. Jim Collins.

CLEAR CREEK COUNTY TOUR

Thursday, July 27

"All Aboard" for a beautiful trip to Clear Creek County and the Georgetown Loop Railroad. Experience train travel through the mountains as it might have been like a hundred years ago, surrounded by the beauty of the Rocky Mountains. We'll begin our trip in the town of Silver Plume and board the train that was completed in 1884, an engineering marvel for its time. We'll go along a corkscrew route gaining 600 feet in elevation, and cross Devil's Gate High Bridge. Midway down the tracks, disembark the train to tour the Lebanon Silver Mine, dating back to the early 1870's. Walk 500 feet into the mine, see rich veins of silver pointed out by the guide, and hear about earlyday mining. Then reboard the train for the remainder of the trip to Georgetown. After the train journey, enjoy free time in the Victorianstyle historic town of Georgetown for lunch and shopping. NOTE: The Lebanon Silver Mine maintains a constant 44 degrees F, so please bring a light jacket and wear good walking shoes.

NY Highway may be Renamed in Honor of 96™

A couple of years ago, the former Association gave assent to Harry Merker to proceed on getting a portion of NY State Hwy #96 re-named to honor the 96th Inf. Div. Harry's brother, Sgt. Jacob L. Merker, 382nd Co. G. was a casualty on Okinawa. There was no money involved and Harry Merker has been pursuing the matter. Here is his most recent report:



"Since 2003, I have been working on renaming a portion of State Rt. 96 near Rochester, NY to honor the 96TH Infantry Division. As of right now, it is in the State Legislature in Albany, NY. It is a formality that requires a bill, and then be signed by New York's governor. Barring the unforseen, that should happen anyday now and be signed by Gov. Pataki. A tentative formal ceremony date has been set for mid-September, 2006 in front of Finger Lakes Race Track in Farmington, NY."

This is a summary of the bill from the New York Legislature's web site: Designates a portion of the state highway system to be known as the "World War II Veterans - 96th Infantry Division of the United States Army Memorial Highway" from all that portion of state highway Route 96, beginning at the intersection of Route 332, heading east and ending at Hook Road in the town of Farmington."

Lieutenant General Simon B. Buckner, Commanding General, Tenth Army, the highest ranking American officer to die in World War II.

General Simon Bolivar Buckner, Jr., graduated from West Point in 1908 and was commissioned in the Infantry. He served as an instructor at Fort Benning and at the Command and General Staff School-from which he graduated in 1925 as a distinguished student. Later duties included service as an instructor, Assistant Commandant, and Commandant of West Point.

In the early days of World War II, General Buckner directed operations against Japanese forces on the Aleutian Islands and subsequently converted those islands into an invasion-proof stronghold.

In 1945, General Buckner was given command of the newly-formed Tenth U.S. Army and with it the task of invading and neutralizing Okinawa. During the fighting, he repeatedly exposed himself to danger by touring the frontlines to encourage his men.

Four days prior to the victory he sought, LTG Buckner was mortally wounded while directing his forces from an advanced observation post. He was the highest ranking officer to lose his life in the war. In 1954, Congress posthumously promoted him to the rank of General.




